### ONE-TENTH OF WEALTH IN U. S. TAX EXEMPT

An estimate that there is outstanding a total of \$30,000,000,000 of bonds entirely or partly tax exempt, from which the government receives no revenue, was made by Dr. Edwin R. A. Seligman, professor of political economy at Columbia university, recently, before the congressional ways Winnetka next week will lose the and means committee, which is considering proposals for constitutional amendment prohibiting further issuance of tax exempt securities.

Dr. Seligman asserted that the government, even during the war, should never have issued tax-exempt bonds. He estimated the amount of outstanding state, county and municipal taxfree bonds at approximately \$10,000,he said, receives no revenue from \$20,-000,000,000 worth of tax-exempt bonds. He asserted that the tax-exempt securities comprise about one-tenth of

Dr. Seligman estimated that if tax exemption of federal bonds could be abolished the government would receive additional annual revenue of approximately \$300,000,000.

The evils of tax exempt securities was summed up in a few words by President Harding in his recent message to Congress, when he said:

"The drift of wealth into non-taxable securities is hindering our induscarrying, until we are discouraging the very activities which make our wealth."




