

WILLIAM BUSSE HAS ENVIABLE RECORD

County Board President Is Seeking Re-Election

Second Floor of Briggs House, Randolph and Wells. Aged carpet. Kitchen Table. Spittoons on newspapers to save the antique carpet. At table, man in charge wearing black velour hat cocked at a sharp angle. Men sitting around on kitchen chairs. Other men going in and out constantly.

I enter, greet the man of importance at the table. He at once introduces me to his friend, Bill; William Busse, President of the Board of Commissioners of Cook county and again standing for nomination. He is a strongly built man pretty nearly sixty years old. Nothing fancy in his appearance, looks just like what he is—farmer, town merchant, rural bank president. I'd been told he was a regular politician. Well, he didn't look like one. Look at his picture in this column and see what you think of him.

He's been on the County board for over 20 years, elected first in 1900. While on the board he was chairman of the finance and other committees. He worked zealously and well. In 1907 he was chosen president of the board.

His experience in public life has been long and varied. For twelve years he has been a member of the Mount Prospect school board. He organized and now is president of the Mt. Prospect National bank. He is now serving his third term as President of the village board of Mt. Prospect.

A look of pride came into his eye as he mentioned the fact that the present splendid county building was completed during his presidency of the county board, as was also the model infirmary at Oak Forest. "Both buildings built within the contract price. Cook county placed on a strictly cash paying basis, \$2,400,000 of the county's bonds redeemed in four years."

He talked earnestly of what he was planning to do if elected. "County roads and county institutions," he said, holding up his hand with two fingers extended. "They're the big things. If I'm president again, we'll have a system of concrete roads in Cook county that can't be matched in all America. All the towns connected so that you can go easily from one to another and you won't have to come back the same way you went. I know this whole great county up and down and east and west. I don't think, either, that anybody can put it over me in the matter of fair prices and good materials for roads.

"And the county institutions. I'm going to do all I can to help the needy people in Cook county. Give the County poor the best care possible. I'm a plain man myself and I know what the people want. And by the way, I think my work as Forest Preserve commissioner ought to be mentioned. I'm a modest man," he said with a human twinkle in his eye, "but I think I've had a good deal with the buying of land for the Forest preserve. I think I've saved quite a little for Cook county. That's all. Good-bye!"

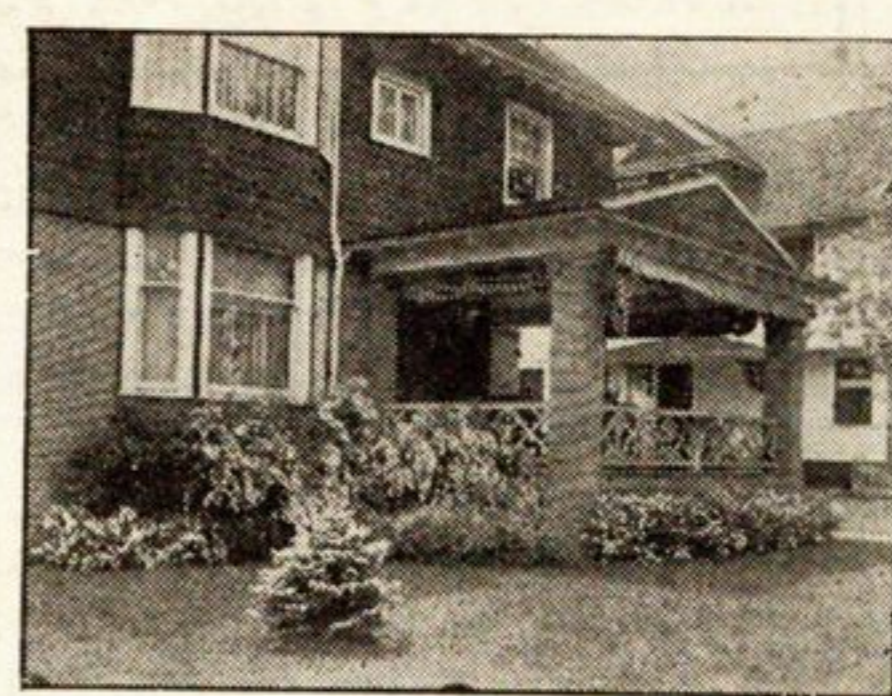

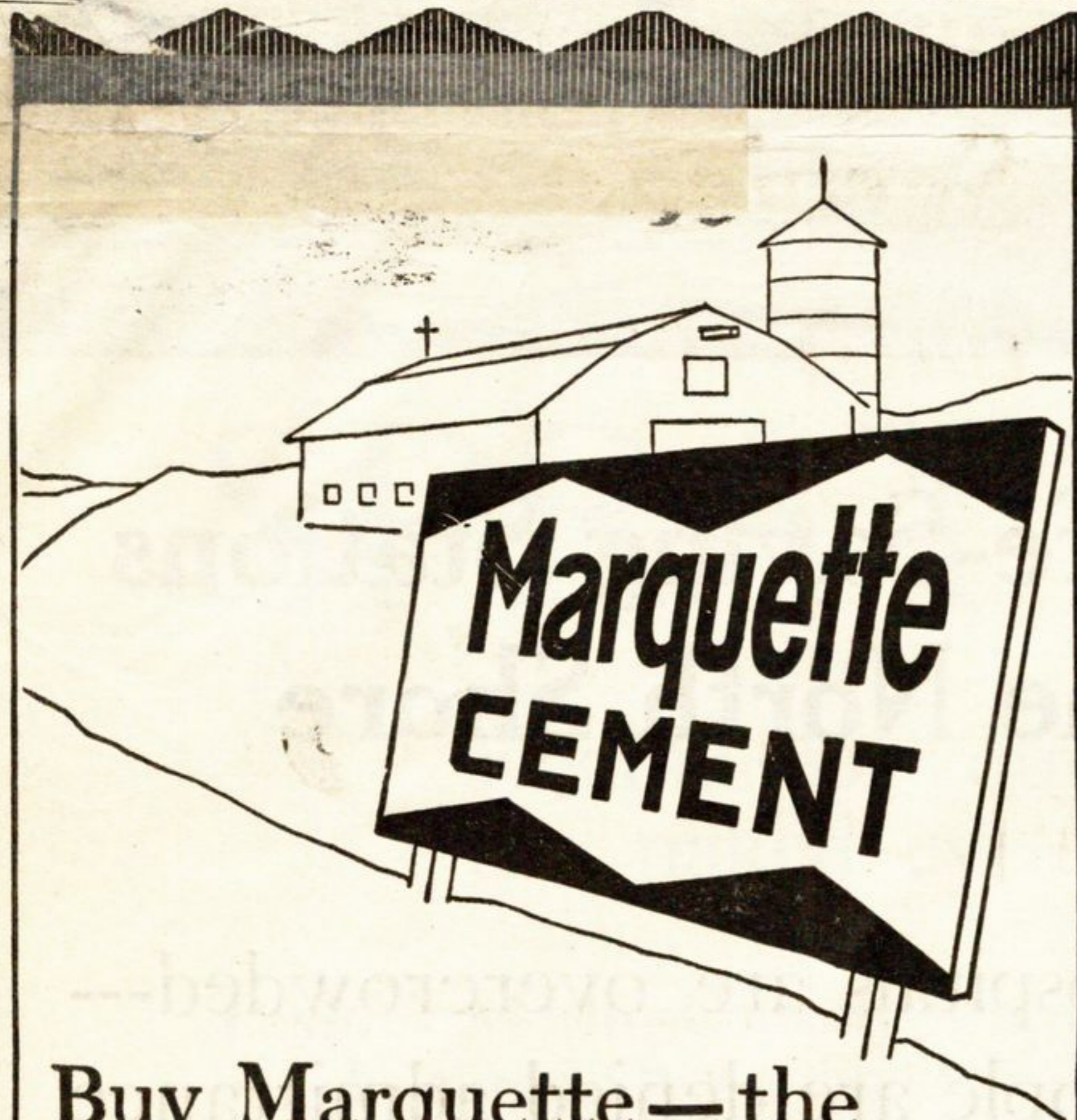
