UNCLE SAM SCHOOLS INCOME TAX EXPERTS

Washington, D. C.-Uncle Sam conducts a school at Washington in which he trains auditors and inspectors for the express purpose of checking up income tax returns.

Each month a new class of 125 "goes to school." They must first pass certain civil service requirements of bookkeeping knowledge and experi-

In the school they receive six weeks' intensive training in the technicalities of the income tax law, by means of lectures and individual instruction by experts. They are paid full salary while under instruction.

Positions are Open.

The Civil Service Commission has announced that it will hold an examination on May 3 throughout the United States to test the qualifications of applicants for positions of auditor and inspector under the Income Tax Unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The entrance salaries offered rage from \$1,800 to \$3,000 a year.
