

INDORSES LITSINGER FOR BOARD OF REVIEW

Well Equipped for Important Post—Murray

-- Voters' League**

In so far as the Legislative Voters League of the State of Illinois is concerned all Seventh district Republican candidates for the General Assembly at the April 11 primaries are estimable men and worthy of consideration by the voting public.

UNCLE SAM SCHOOLS INCOME TAX EXPERTS

Washington, D. C.—Uncle Sam conducts a school at Washington in which he trains auditors and inspectors for the express purpose of checking up income tax returns.

Each month a new class of 125 "goes to school." They must first pass certain civil service requirements of bookkeeping knowledge and experience.

In the school they receive six weeks' intensive training in the technicalities of the income tax law, by means of lectures and individual instruction by experts. They are paid full salary while under instruction.

Positions are Open.

The Civil Service Commission has announced that it will hold an examination on May 3 throughout the United States to test the qualifications of applicants for positions of auditor and inspector under the Income Tax Unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The entrance salaries offered range from \$1,800 to \$3,000 a year.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from the Civil Service Board at the post office or customhouse in any city.

Cocaine Smugglers In France Become Adroit

Paris—Despite the strictest lookout exercised by the police force, inland and on the frontiers, trafficking in cocaine goes on as ever in France. Now that it is not safe to smuggle the drug in aeroplanes other means had to be found, and some of those employed are most ingenious and have so far escaped police notice. Mixing cocaine with ordinary face powder is one form. Other means used are hollow heels in shoes and boots, hollow canes and umbrella handles. Cheap plaster dolls are also used.

These articles, filled with cocaine and often opium, are sent out of the country or received into France, and only those initiated know about their secrets. A password is, however, necessary to buy them.
