Teacher at Chikava Thanks Schools for Donation

One hundred dollars, donated by Winnetka School children and dispatched several months ago, to Dr. A vote of thanks was given the first Alice Barlow-Brown, Winnetka physifurthering education in that war-devastated country.

That fact is substantiated in the accompanying letter received recently by Miss Gahn, Art instructor in the Skokie school, from Greten Dinitch, school superintendent at Chickava,

Serbia. The letter, translated from the French by Miss Auslands, instructor in French in the public schools, reads as follows:

"Serbia, January 31, 1922. "Miss Gahan:

"I have the honor of informing you that I received through Dr. Alice Barlow-Brown \$100 as the help towards a new school for the village Chickava, which had been badly ruined by the Bulgarians during the war, when fifty boys were killed and the houses destroyed.
