

GOLF GOSSIP

After a month of eliminations the survivors of the June class tournament at the Winnetka Playfield course will play off the final round Saturday afternoon. Championships in three classes are to be settled.

A. E. Slosson will meet W. T. Dahl in the class A event. J. E. Bradstreet will settle the class B supremacy with A. V. Horsman. In class C, H. C. McKinnie will play the winner of the semi-final match between George Borncamp and P. Borncamp which has not been announced.

The July Class tournament will start on the following Saturday. Three flights of sixteen players are expected to start in the qualifying round. The subsequent rounds will be played on succeeding Sundays.

A field of eighty-five local stars turned out for the invitation tournament held this week at Indian Hill. The meet offered good chance for the settling of grudges arising from the tournament held last week by the Chicago District Golf association, where Ira Couch won the title in nineteen holes.

The course did not lie idle this week, for on Thursday a two ball mixed foursome handicap was staged. On account of the invitation tournament the weekly women's day could not be held.

The semi-finals of the Hoyt cup will be played Saturday. Paul Wilder played an excellent game Saturday, turning in a card of 73 for eighteen holes. Judge Collins won honors with low net, 79-12-67. H. Pope with 88-20-68 tied for second low net with Wilder, whose net card read 73-5-68.

Jock Hutchison showed a flash of his last year's style by featuring the first day's play in the British Open

with the low card. He showed that his defeat in the Gleneagles tournament was no indication of his real ability. He will meet the British stars for a third time when they meet at Skokie in the National Open. Although only three Americans started the British tourney, a large number of his native opponents will cross the water for a shot at the National title.

The semifinals of the Four Towns tournament now in progress at Skokie will be played off Saturday. In a blind bogie last week four men tied for first low net. C. M. Cavanaugh had low gross of the four with a card of 92, but greater handicaps brought the three opponents to the tie for low net honors. F. C. Thomas, 95-23-72; S. Murch, 97-25-72, and H. Koseke, 98-26-72, were the other winners who tied with Cavanaugh.

S. L. Williams will meet H. C. Mershon and G. L. Sibley will compete against G. Murch in the semifinals for the Glencoe cup. H. R. Kimbark will play with J. D. Galbraith and F. E. Blunden will go around with B. T. Buck in the Evanston division. Dr. Burrill is paired with J. S. Pole and E. R. Hankins is matched with M. B. Orde in the Winnetka race. W. J. Champion meets W. A. Kittermaster and H. H. Curtis plays against F. M. DeBeers for honors in the Wilmette class.

Two men will survive this round in each division for the finals next week.

At the North Shore Golf club the qualifying round of the Directors' cup will be played Saturday afternoon, eighteen to qualify. The round will be over eighteen holes and will be a handicap affair.

C. D. Heller and Alex Joslyn won honors last week. Heller won an

eighteen hole handicap with low net. The remaining rounds of the Directors' cup will be played on following weeks.

Dr. L. L. McArthur won the grandfathers' trophy at Glen View Saturday with a card of 91-21-70 and tied for first in Class D of the handicap with E. F. Skinner.

That golf is gaining in popularity in the Western conference is shown by the fact that nine out of the ten universities entered teams in the intercollegiate tournament. Iowa was the only school which failed to enter. In a similar event held at Indian Hill last year only four teams were entered. Many of the Big 10 players are becoming well known in amateur ranks. George Hartman of Chicago, who was eliminated in the C. D. G. A. tournament at Oak Park by last year's champion, was considered the favorite for individual honors. He was beaten out last year by Robert McKee, of Drake university, in twenty holes, but no schools outside the conference were invited this year, so the dangerous competitor was eliminated. Chicago university went through a season of college competition without a defeat and this record was made possible by Hartman's brilliant playing.

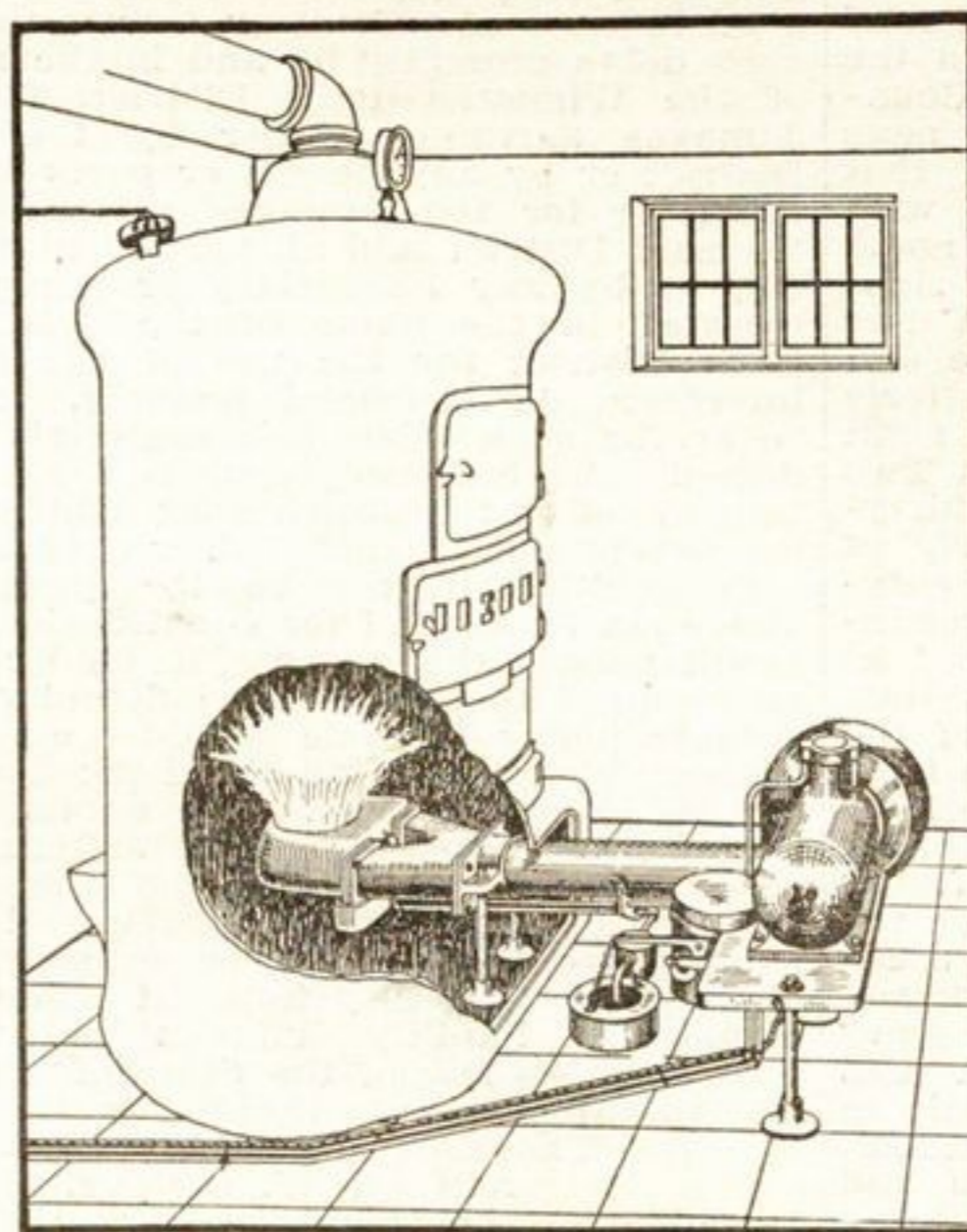

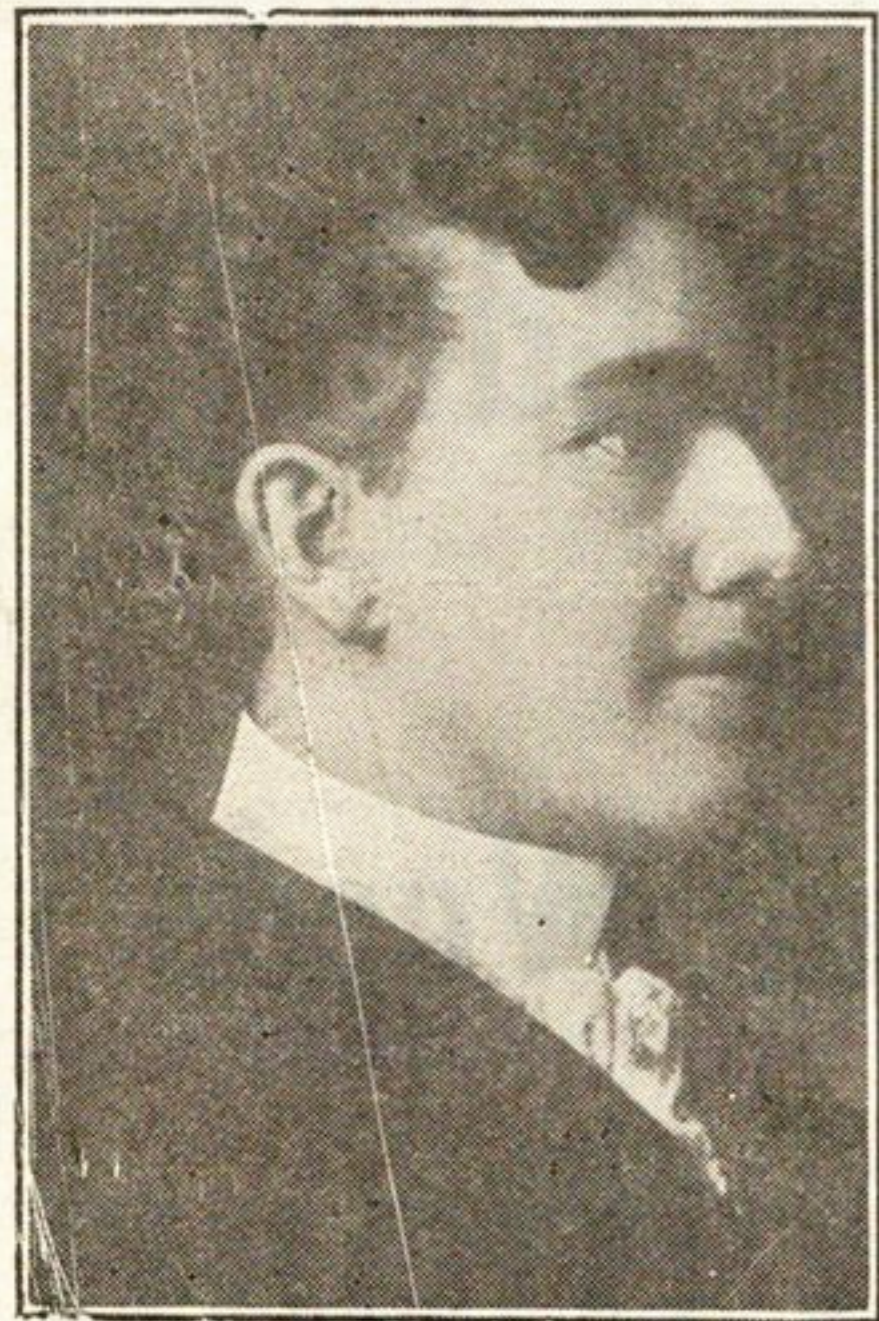
