Ravinia Season Formally Opened. La Navarraise Tonight

Ravinia is to have a repertoire of thirty-three operas this season, according to Louis Eckstein, who is entering upon his second decade as Ravinia's entrepreneur. Among the operas are: "Lucia di Lammermoor," "Rigoletto," "La Traviata," and "Carmen." "Lakme," which proved so successful in 1919, is to be revived this year. The new additions to the Ravinia repertoire will be of varied character. Verdi's "Otello," Mascagni's "L'Amico Fritz," and Leroux's "Le Chemineau." The opera to be presented this evening is "La Navarraise" and "Cavalleria." On Sunday evening, the famous popular opera "Lucia" will be given.
