## Book Reviews

"I can always leave off talking when I hear a master play." So Browning, himself one of the Great Ones. And it is always true. Nor, in order to show their genius, do the performances of the masters always have to be epic poems or splendid symphonies. There can be great art in a fandango or a limerick, and an allegro passage can be as beautiful as one played andante. Joy can be as artistically articulated as tragedy.

When we understand this we can approach Edgar Saltus's posthumous GHOST GIRL in the proper spirit.

After his mighty canvases of Rome and Russia painted in bloody crimson, royal purple and gloomy gray the GHOST GIRL, all pinks and blues with its clear greys and its center of scarlet comes trippingly into our surprised and, at first, doubtful vision.

But though he uses an unfamiliar palette, the master touch is always present.

The story is that of a young cosmopolitan, Jim Brandish, who inherits a great fortune and settles in New York. Timid and a man of the open road no girl has ever touched him until he meets his Helen, Nelly Chilton. She, repelled dually by a sinister birth mark he bears and by being altogether in love with another is nevertheless "jockeyed" into a marriage with Jim. They start, per automobile, on their honeymoon and five minutes later she and the chauffeur are dead, he critically injured and the car a heap of scrap iron.

Then comes the reappearance of the dead Nelly and Jim's efforts to reach her across the void. How the ghost is finally laid must not be told but the plot is carried forward cleverly and is plausible, always plausible.

There is likewise a subplot relating the love story of Jim's chum, one Chandos Poole, out of whose mouth we hear the whole tale.

All through the book there runs true humor like a strain of music. There are likewise many Victorian descriptions of food and strong drink. Volstead surely ought to pass another law making it an offense to write so real-

istically and thirst-provokingly about the condemned grape as to make innocent readers long to become breakers of the eighteenth amendment.

But plot, humor and gastronomy are but side issues. Style, style is everything and lying in his grave Mr. Saltus has left us the GHOST GIRL to open for him the door of eternity.

I would ask only that the literary editors of both the Heavenly Harp and the Asbestos American please copy this review so that Mr. Saltus will be sure to know how much I enjoyed his book.

ernors consulted the leaders of various activities using Community House, and their opinion was unanimous that it would be far better to wait until next spring when every indication points to a considerable reduction in the cost of building.

In the meantime, the architect's plans and specifications are completed, and the building situation will be watched closely, so that it will be possible to go ahead with construction on very short notice when the situation reaches a favorable point.

The Governors are greatly disappointed that the public is not going to have the benefit of the increased facilities planned last spring during the present year but feel that they are acting in the best interests of the it, this providing very much better facilities for dramatics, concerts and other entertainments requiring more modern stage equipment than has hitherto been available in the community.

By deferring the building until next community, and particularly of the subscribers, in delaying matters as described above.

It will be interesting to the subscribers and public to know that thus far the sum of \$65,000 has been pledged toward the construction of the new building. Subscriptions from Winnetka residents who were absent at the time of the campaign and some people who could not be reached at that time are still coming in.

### New Legion Quarters

As stated in June after the active canvass was completed the fund subscribed will not permit under any conditions, the accomplishment of the full plans of the Governors. The idea of a separate assembly hall or auditorium has been given up. The gymnasium stage will remain as at present. The seven new club rooms will be built as planned, including quarters for the American Legion, for the Camp Fire Girls, and for the Boy Scouts and the large center or assembly room and increased kitchen facilities will also go through. The present plans on which bids were taken included a large and entirely adequate stage of permanent construction, with provision for dressing rooms, toilets, etc., to occupy one end of the assembly room. Loose seats were to be provided for this room and it is estimated that 350 to 400 people could be accommodated in spring, the Governors confidently hope that this program can be carried through to a successful completion.

Community House activities will formally open on October 1 and full announcement of program will be made before that time.

The Governors voted, at their meeting on Monday, to give again the annual Halloween party to the village and appointed a committee to make plans for it.
