Although teachers are most conscientious in the matter of awarding grades, we cannot entirely eliminate the human element that enters in, and this admits of a considerable probability of error. The best we can do is constantly to strive to be as painstaking, judicious and accurate as possible in placing our evaulations upon the work of our high school boys and girls.






