

ARTICLE LAUDS LOCAL CITIZENS

Woolhiser Pays Tribute in Magazine Article

Winnetka comes in for considerable boost at the instance of village manager H. L. Woolhiser, in an article from his pen appearing in the January issue of the City Manager Magazine and entitled "City Management of Winnetka."

In the article Manager Woolhiser endorses a quotation appearing in a recent issue of the American Magazine which termed Winnetka as "The town where people pull together."

"The citizens of Winnetka pull together and their government provides all modern services. The water and light plant pays 6 per cent on the investment," Mr. Woolhiser writes.

He states further that "although the enactment of city manager legislation in the state of Illinois has not kept pace with the rest of the country, there are at least two municipalities in the state which have enjoyed the full benefits of the city-manager plan of government."

"I refer," he continues "to the villages of Winnetka and Glencoe..... with a combined population of some 12,000 people. The experience of Winnetka is typical of both municipalities."

Manager Woolhiser gives a very graphic description of the administration of government in Winnetka, an account of local civic achievement and an insight into future plans of the village.

In conclusion he pays a tribute to the citizenry of the village when he writes:

"It should not be understood that the foregoing accomplishments are claimed to be inherent attributes of the manager plan. The form of government of any city will not necessarily bring results unless supported by a public-spirited and progressive citizenship, alive to the problems and needs of the community. It can be said, however, without boastfulness that the adoption of the city-manager plan has made easier the accomplishment of municipal progress in Winnetka. It is the vehicle through which the will of the community is efficiently expressed in action, and is therefore considered to be a step forward in democracy."

Winnetka, Illinois, February 17, 1923.
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed bids for the construction of an improvement of that part of the North Twenty (20) acres of the South Forty (40) acres of the Southwest Quarter of Section Twenty-one (21), Township Forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian, lying east of and adjoining the Easterly line of Wilson Street and south of and adjoining the South line of Hill Road; also that part of the South Twenty (20) acres of the South Forty (40) acres of the Southwest Quarter of Section Twenty-one (21), Township Forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian, lying east of and adjoining the Easterly line of Wilson Street and north of and adjoining the North line of Winnetka Avenue; also Lot One (1) of Esentrot's Subdivision of Lots Twenty-seven (27) and Twenty-eight (28) of Trier Center Neighborhood, being a subdivision of Lot 7 of Circuit Court Partition, in the Southwest Quarter of Section Twenty-one (21), Township Forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian, Winnetka, Illinois, according to the plat of the said Esentrot's Subdivision filed in the office of the Registrar of Titles of Cook County, Illinois, on the first day of July, A. D. 1921, as Document No. 134993, by grading, draining, grubbing, seeding, leveling, smoothing and rolling the surface of the same to receive the planting and seeding, by the removal of buildings and rubbish, by the construction of a water sprinkling system, including a brick masonry water meter vault and connection to the present water main in Wilson Street, with cast iron lawn sprinkler hydrants, by the planting of trees and shrubs, and by the construction of limestone macadam walks five feet in width, including all necessary labor and materials, engineering and supervision during the construction of said proposed improvement, all in the Winnetka Park District in the County of Cook and State of Illinois, otherwise known as Winnetka Park District Assessment No. 369,931 in accordance with the ordinance heretofore passed therefor, will be received by the Board of Local Improvements of the Winnetka Park District by or before eight o'clock P. M. on Thursday, the first day of March, A. D. 1923, at which hour all bids will be opened at a meeting to be held in the Council Chamber of the Village Hall, in said Village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois.

The specifications of said improvement are on file in the office of the Park Manager at the Village Hall in said Village of Winnetka.
Contractors will be paid by cash warrant duly authorized at the first regular meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Winnetka Park District for all work upon the recommendation of the Park Engineer duly certified in writing to the Board of Local Improvements of said Winnetka Park District.

The successful bidder for the construction of said improvement will be required to enter into a bond in a sum equal to the amount of such bid, with sureties to be approved by the President of the Board of Local Improvements of the Winnetka Park District, and filed with the said Board of Local Improvements, which bond shall provide that the contractor shall well and faithfully perform and execute said work in all respects according to the complete and detailed specifications and full and complete drawings, profiles and models therefor and according to the time and terms and conditions of the contract, and also that such bidder and contractor shall promptly pay all debts incurred by such bidder or contractor in the prosecution of such work, including those for labor

and materials furnished, and that suit may be brought on such bond in case of default or failure to pay such debts promptly, by and in the name of the Winnetka Park District, for all damages sustained either by the said District or by any person or party interested, or for the damages sustained by the said District and all parties in interest, or by any beneficiary or party interested in the name of the Winnetka Park District for the use of the party interested as beneficial plaintiff, to recover for such labor and materials furnished. All bids or proposals shall contain an offer to furnish such bond upon the acceptance of such bid or proposal.

In addition to the bond required as above set forth, and for construction and maintenance, the successful bidder will be required to furnish an indemnity and defense policy in some reliable company, indemnifying the Winnetka Park District against loss from liability for damages on account of injury or death suffered by reason of the performance of the work required to be performed by the said contractor, by any person or persons, including such liability imposed under the Employers' liability and Workmen's Compensation law of the State of Illinois, and the amendments thereto, in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).

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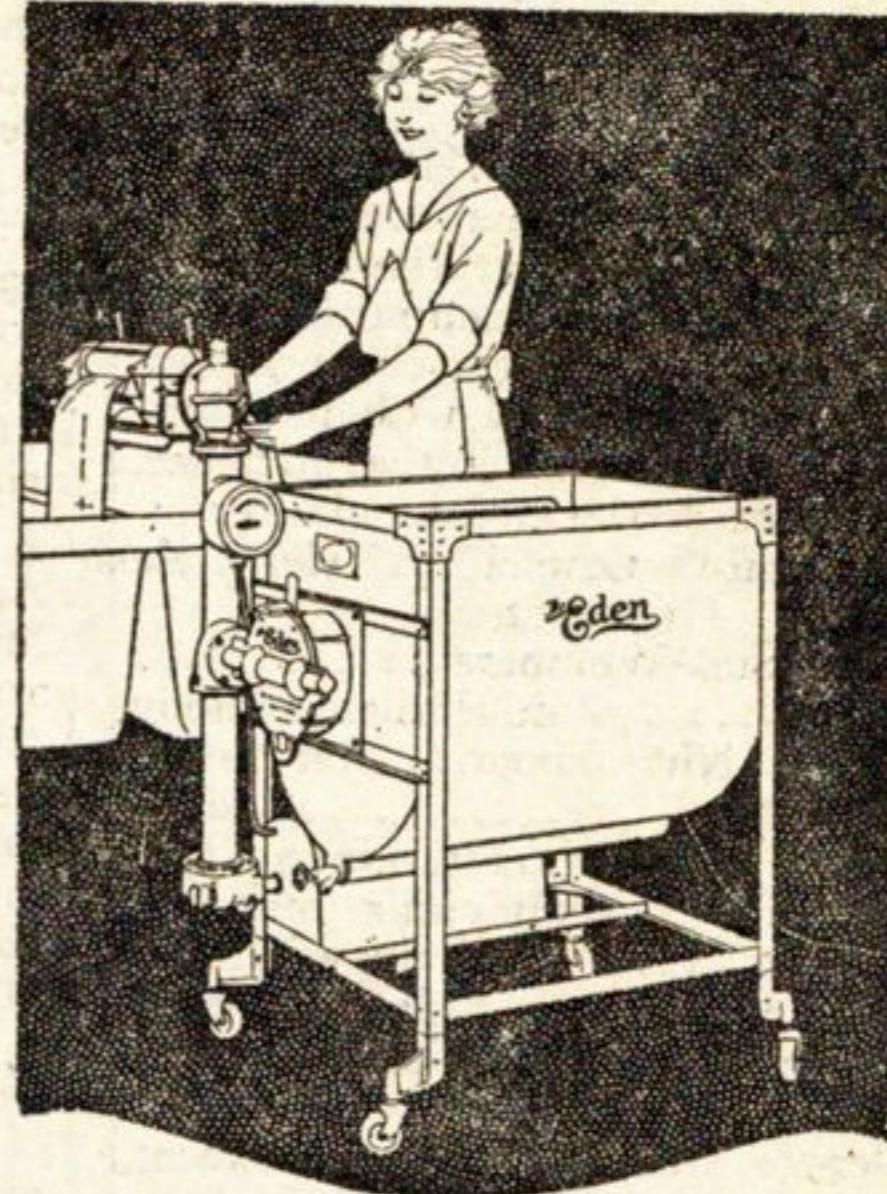
