"Little Symphony" Closes
Orchestra Season In
Blaze of Glory

Great Demand for 1923-24
Tickets

The New Trier Township Orchestral association closed a successful first year of activity Tuesday evening of this week when the "Little Symphony" orchestra, George Dasch, director, concluded its series of concerts at New Trier high school auditorium.

Tuesday's concert, like those preceding it, was received with great enthusiasm by a large audience of north shore music lovers. The orchestra, numbering thirty-two pieces in the first concert, thirty-two on the second appearance and thirty-eight in the third program, was swelled to forty-three for the final event of the season.

Granquist Gets Ovation

Arthur N. Granquist, pianist, of 1002 Central avenue, Wilmette, who appeared as soloist with the orchestra, was accorded a great ovation.

During the intermission Tuesday evening officers of the association circulated new subscription blanks for the 1923-24 concert series. While the response to this invitation to "sign up" for next season has not been calculated to date, the subsequent number of inquiries concerning memberships indicates that season tickets will be in great demand.

It was announced that this season's ticket-holders—members of the association—will be given the first opportunity to secure seats for next year.

Tentative plans for next season include thirteen appearances of the "Little Symphony" orchestra on the north shore. Six of the proposed concerts will be for children and high school pupils, and seven for adults. This season there were eight concerts divided evenly between children and adults.
