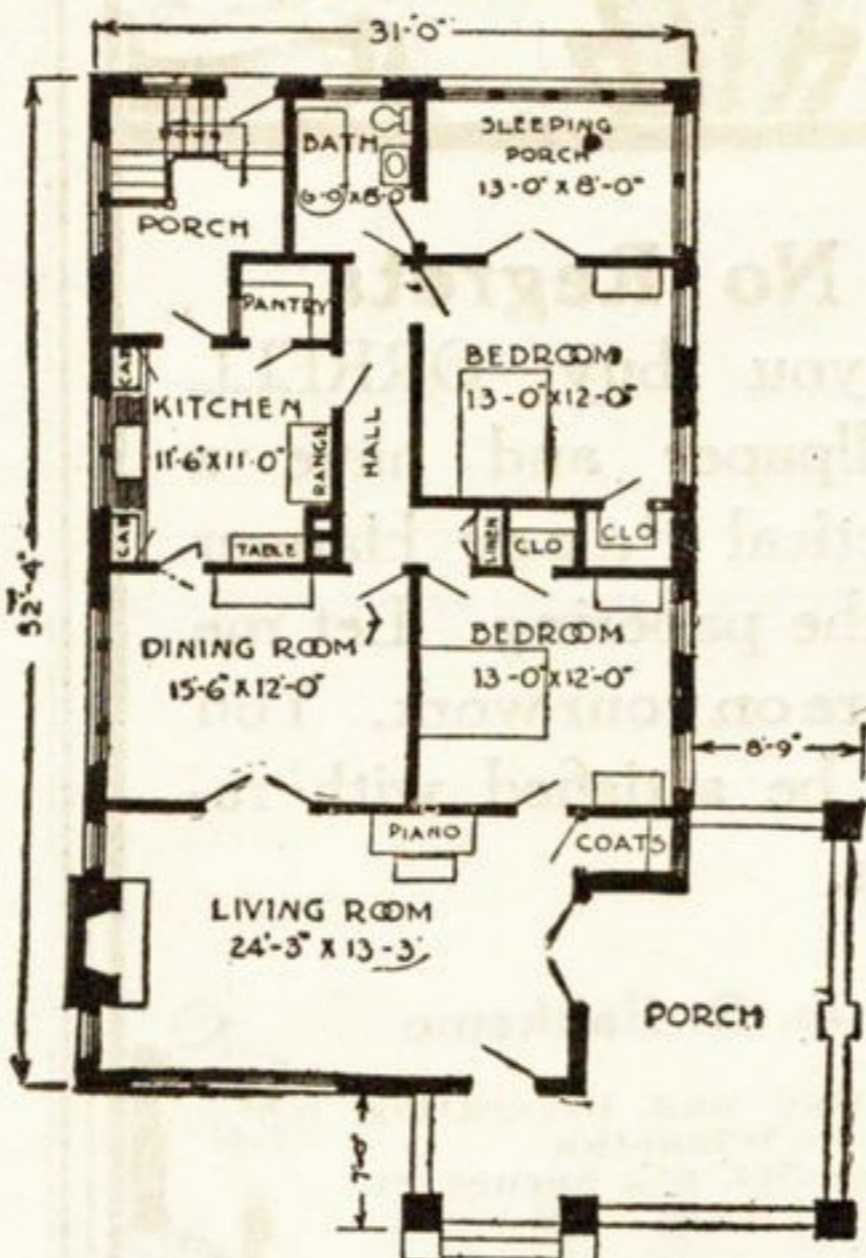
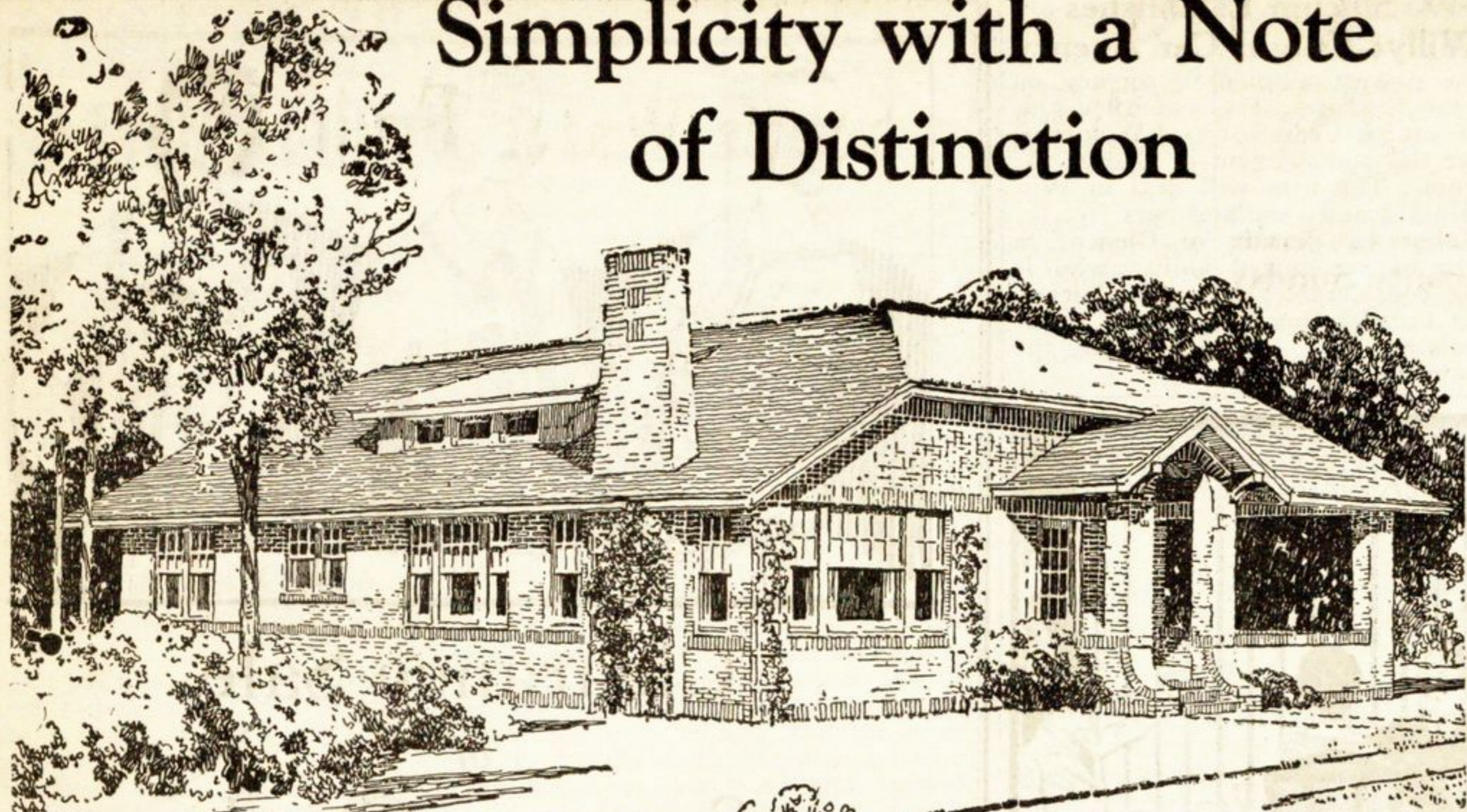


Simplicity with a Note of Distinction

Simplicity does not mean lack of interest in a well-designed house. In fact, in the small house simplicity is essential in giving the house distinction. Meaningless ornamentation, heavy eaves, ponderous pillars are the ruination of many a bungalow.

The designer of this house has been exceptionally successful in creating a charming house without adding costly features to create interest. He has taken a simple design, and by skill and attention to details given it unusual distinction.

With this type of house, simple in its outline, much thought should be given the type of face brick to be used and how it should be handled in the wall. The color of the mortar, the treatment of the joint, and the kind of bond are things often overlooked, but which, if given careful consideration, will greatly enhance the beauty of the brickwork, much to the advantage of the whole house.

The living room and dining room in this bungalow are very large and comfortable. There is a cozy brick fireplace at one end of the living room, while French doors at the opposite end open to a fine, large porch.

The porch at the side of the house may be screened, or glazed and used as a room, while the small portion in the front serves as an entrance only. An always useful coat closet is found conveniently near the front door.

The bedrooms are well lighted, have good closets, and are connected with the bath by a convenient hall. A sleeping porch is also provided at rear of the house.

As many hours in each day are spent in the kitchen, it should be as pleasant as possible and so arranged as to save time and steps. The kitchen here is exceptionally complete and convenient. The sink is set beneath a group of two windows flanked on the sides by cabinets.

The table is so placed with a serving door above it that things may be passed directly from the kitchen to the sideboard of the dining room. The rear porch is large and has space for the icebox. It is enclosed and contains the basement stairs.

A fifty-foot lot would be required on which to build this bungalow as shown in the plan, but the porch may easily be moved to the front of the house, making it adaptable to as small a site as thirty-seven and a half feet. This bungalow may be built on a sloping site by making a slight change in the front or rear steps.

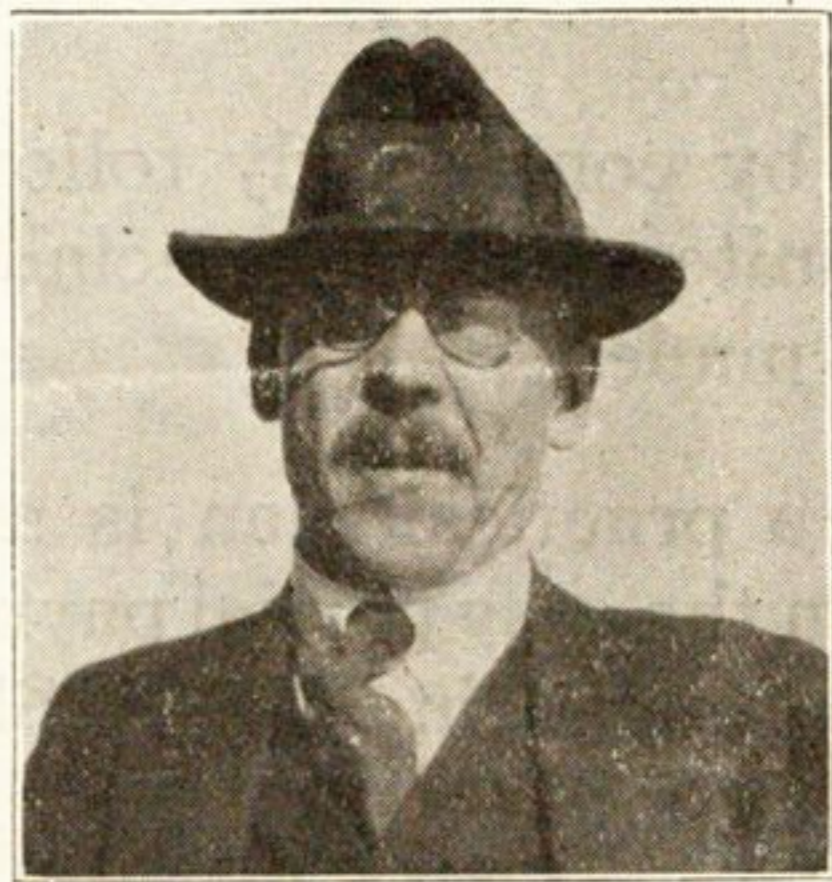

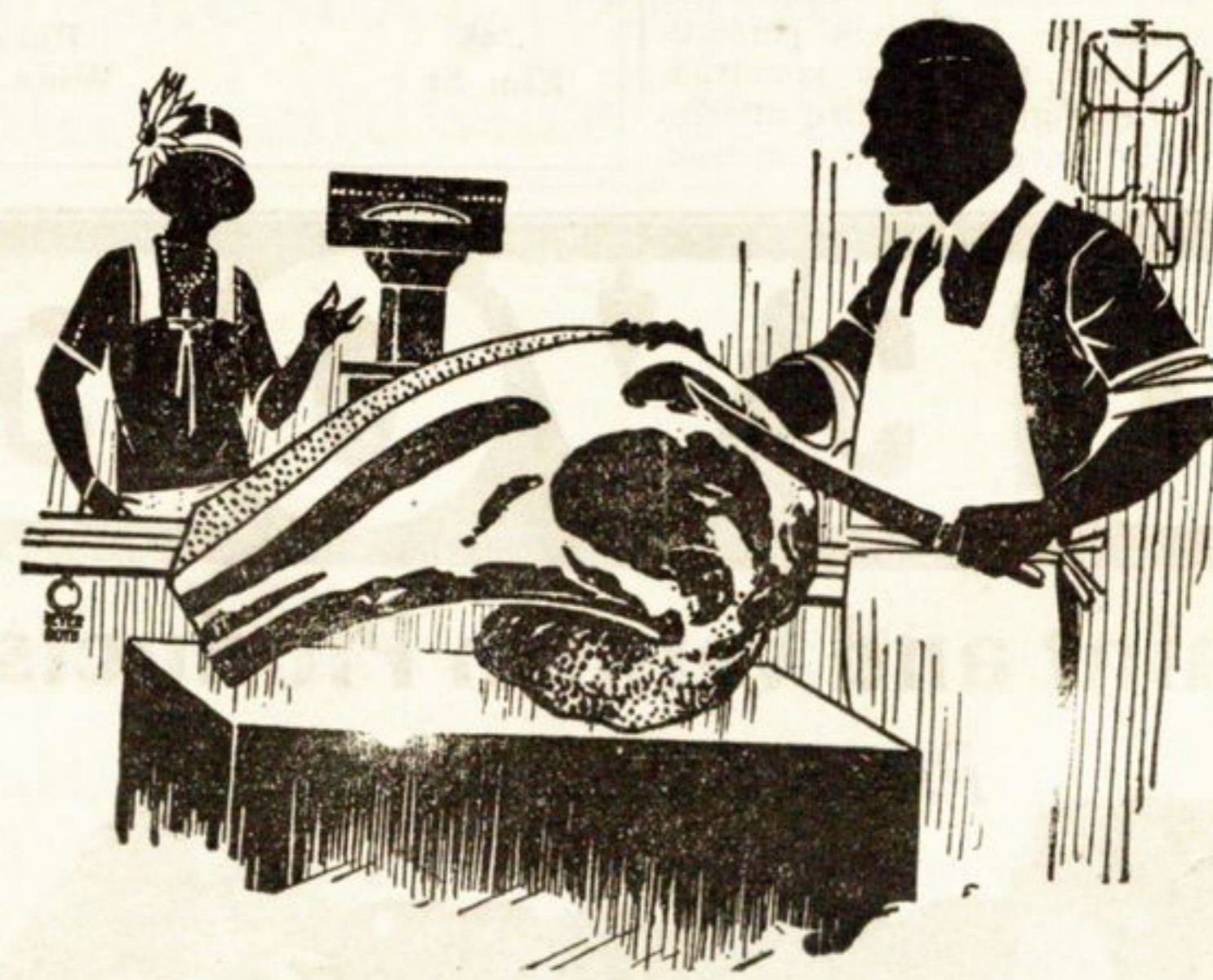
