MASONS ERECT GREAT MEMORIAL

Will Honor George Washington at Ceremony

A number of Masons in the vicinity are planning to attend the ceremonies accompanying the laying of the cornerstone of The George Washington Masonic National Memorial at Alexandria, Va., on Thursday, November 1, it is announced. The event will draw together the largest number of Masons ever attending any ceremony.

This memorial is an expression of the esteem in which the Masons of the United States hold Washington, the Mason. It will be the grandest memorial ever erected to any individual. The dimensions of the edifice over all will be 230 feet in depth by 160 feet in width, exclusive of steps, terraces and approaches. One of its big features will be an imposing atrium, 70 feet wide and 100 feet deep, which will form the Me- Saturday evening. morial Hall, in which a statue of George Washington will be set up. C., of which it will command a view, and from its height also Mount Vernon will be visible.

Alexandria was chosen for the site of this memorial because President Washington was the first Worshipful Master of the Masonic Blue lodge in that city. This lodge has numerous priceless relics of the first president, including the Williams portrait, which is declared by experts to be the truest likeness in existence of the "father of his country."

The cost of the memorial and the endowment will reach \$4,000,000, all of which the Masons of the United States are contributing. When the cornerstone is laid November 1, the trowel used by General Washington when he laid the cornerstone of the national capitol building in Washington, D. C., will be utilized. All railroads will give reduced fares to those who journey to Washington and Alexandria for the cornerstone laying event.
