Winnetka, Illinois, Sept. 29, 1923. Notice is hereby given that sealed bids for the construction of the following improvement:

For the improvement of OAK STREET from and connecting with the present pavement at the west line extended of Glendale Avenue to a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet west of the east line extended of Hibbard Road; also CHERRY STREET from and connecting with the present pavement at the east line extended of Glendale Avenue to a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet west of the east line extended of Hibbard Road; also ASH STREET from and connecting with the present pavement at a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet east of the west line extended of Rosewood Avenue to a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet west of the east line extended of Hibbard Road; also GLENDALE AVENUE from and connecting with the present pavement at the south line extended of Oak Street to and connecting with the present pavement at a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet south of the north line extended of Willow Street, including the three alleys returns on the east side of said Glendale Avenue as far back as the east line extended of Glendale Avenue, and excepting the pavement herein proposed at the intersections of said Glendale Avenue with Cherry Street and Ash Street; also BERKELEY AVENUE from and connecting with the pavement herein proposed at a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet north of the south line extended of Oak Street to and connecting with the present pavement at a line parallel with and twenty-two (22) feet south of the north line extended of Willow Street, excepting the pavement herein proposed at the intersections of said Berkeley Avenue with Cherry Street and Ash Street, by excavating, filling, grading, grubbing, rolling and preparing the subgrade to receive the proposed pavement, constructing brick masonry manholes, catch basins, manhole catch basins and a valve vault, constructing tile pipe drains, tile pipe culverts, Portland cement concrete tile pipe culverts and concrete headwalls for culverts, adjusting present manhole covers and valve vault covers, removing trees, grading the parkways, and paving with a one (1) course reinforced Portland cement concrete pavement with integral curbs, protecting, curing and cleaning said pavement, and connecting said proposed pavement with present pavements, including all trenching, backfilling, the re-

moval of all surplus excavated materials, and cost of engineering services, all in the Village of Winnetka, County of Cook and State of Illinois, said improvement and assessment being otherwise known as Winnetka Special Assessment No. 392,764, in accordance with the ordinance heretofore passed therefor, will be received by the Board of Local Improvements of the Village of Winnetka by or before 7:30 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, the sixteenth day of October, A. D. 1923, at which hour all bids will be opened at a meeting to be held in the Council Chamber of the Village Hall, in the said Village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois. The specifications of said improvement are on file in the office of the Clerk of said Village of Winnetka. Contractors will be paid in bonds bearing interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum for all estimates approved by the Board of Local Improvements in the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and over when the amount of balance due on any estimate is less than the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), the same will be paid by time warrants. In addition to the usual bond for construction and maintenance in the sum equal to one-third of the amount of the bid accepted by the Board of Local Improvements, the suc-

cessful bidder will be required to furnish an indemnity and defense policy in some reliable company indemnifying the Village of Winnetka against loss from liability for damages on account of injury or death suffered by reason of the performance of the work required to be performed by the said contractor, by any person or persons including such liability imposed under the employers' liability and workmen's

compensation law of the State of Illinois, and the amendments thereto, in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).
