The Village attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance in that regard for introduction at the next council

In connection with the Diller street vacation plan the Streets, Drainage and Forestry committee received several objections from property owners on Forest street who were of the opinion that the street in question should be retained open as a parking space for patrons of the school, who otherwise park their cars on Forest street.

The school authorities, in that connection, agreed, in writing, that, in the event of the vacation of Diller street, parking space would be provided on the school grounds, and promised strict compliance with police regulations prohibiting parking on Forest street.

The objections were withdrawn, it was said, upon the assurance that there would be no parking on Forest street.




