enough to invoke deep public concern, declares Dr. Isaac D. Rawlings, state health director, who takes occasion to point out that a great deal of pneumonia can be prevented and

that probably a considerable percentage of mortality from this cause is needless and could be avoided by proper and sufficient care. "Last year pneumonia caused 6,083 deaths in Illinois, an average of 16

daily, and more than the total mortality from all other infectious diseases combined, tuberculosis alone excluded" said the director. "There were 15,189 cases reported in 1922, a number greater than for any other

single disease except measles, influenza and tuberculosis. For the first ten months of this year the pneu-

monia incidence was exceeded by that of measles alone. "Most estimates place the fatality

from pneumonia at about one in each four or five cases. Last year the 6,083 deaths out of 15189 cases reported gave a fatality rate of 40 out of each 100, or nearly half. Probably all cases were not reported so that this fatality rate is rather high but it empha-

sizes the extreme danger of the discase and shows the importance of pre-11 venting it whenever possible. "Since pneumonia is caused by a germ and is spread from one person. to another through such excretions as sputum and droplets from the nose and throat it is reasonable to believe that precautions to avoid close contact with "coughers," "sneezers" and "spitters" will prevent a great many cases. Excretions from people who are actually sick with pneumonia are

"To prevent pneumonia one must keep fit, avoid undue fatigue, chills, alcoholic excess, unnecessary exposure, wet feet and get plenty of wholesome food, sleep, fresh air and exercise. When pneumonia is unusually prevalent one should avoid crowded, poorly ventilated rooms and take un-

usual precautions about close or intimate contact. When pneumonia is present in the home the patient should go to bed in a well ventilated room at once and stay there under the care of a physician until well. Perhaps no other act on the part of a patient will so unfavorably influence the outcome of pneumonia than to stay out of bed after the disease gets in, or to get up during the course of the disease.
