The principal items of identification noted by Miss Paxton were a dark colored mackinaw and a gray cap. She said the youthful robber appeared to be about five feet in height.

Miss Betty Kirchner is directing winter sports contests on the Horace Mann school playgrounds and the children are entering into the rivalry with great enthusiasm.

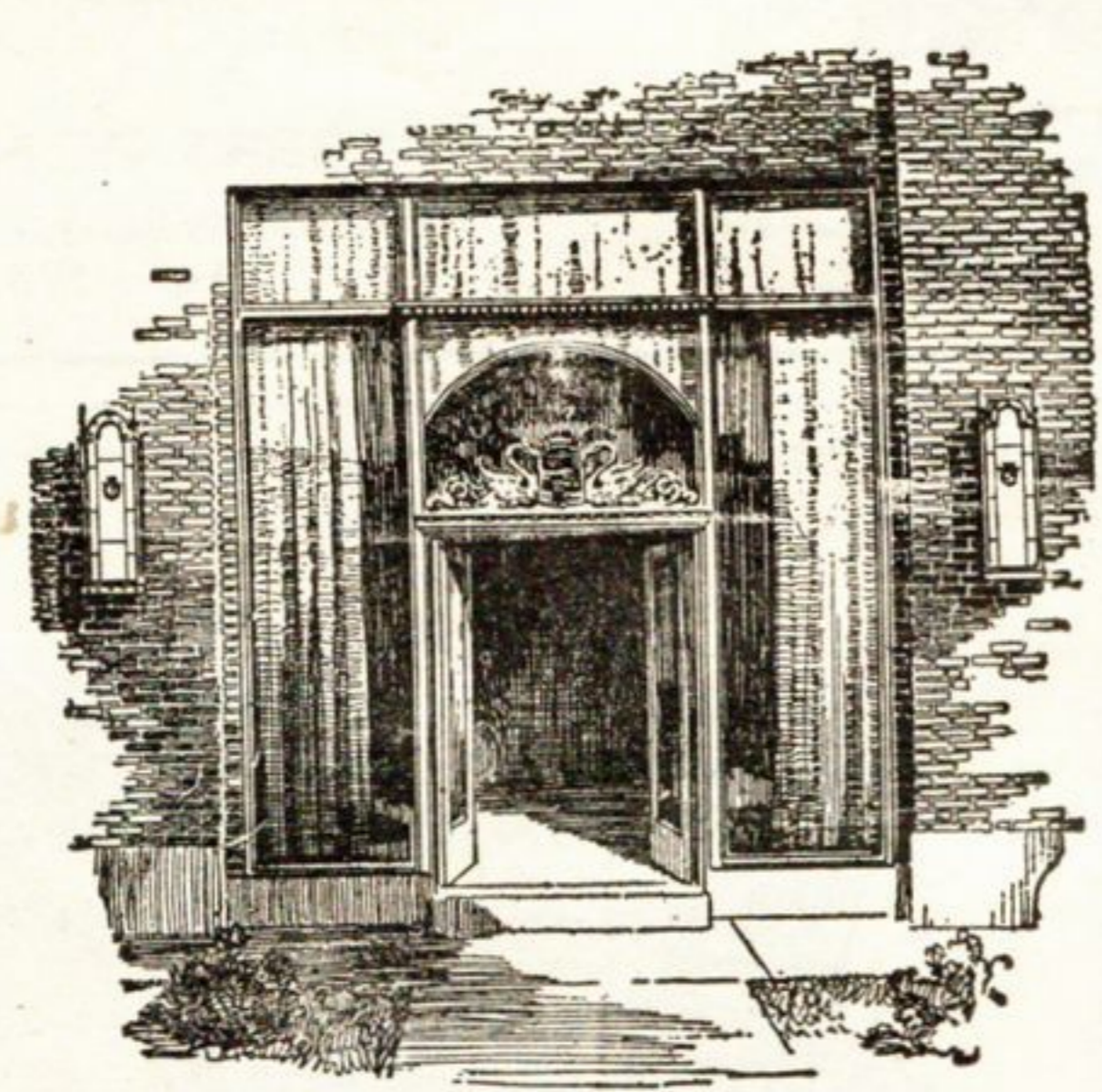
\$840 FIRE DAMAGE
