

N. U. TO HOLD STUDENT MEET

Prominent Speakers for Conference Next Week

Two more nationally prominent men have been added to the list of speakers at the Northwestern Student conference to be held at the university February 5 and 6, the executive committee in charge announced this week.

Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr of Detroit and Dr. L. K. Williams of Chicago are the speakers most recently selected. They will address the conference on the two biggest problems confronting them, namely the question of race relations and of the problem of war.

On Investigation Tour
Dr. Niebuhr is at present pastor of the Bethel Evangelical church in Detroit. During the last year, however, he has been away from his charge and has been traveling in Europe with the Kirby Page mission which was investigating conditions in Germany, France, Belgium, Russia, and Italy.

He has been lecturing extensively for the Fellowship of a Christian social order since his return, and has proved himself to have a depth of knowledge and a breadth of outlook that will enable him to handle the problem of international relations and war in a thorough manner.

One of the leading negro thinkers of North America, Dr. Lacy K. Williams, will talk on the Negro problem in this country. Dr. Williams' broadmindedness and comprehensive grasp of the race problem won for him a

place on the interracial commission of Chicago.

His history has been that of an educator and leader of his race. For three years he was dean of a large colored college at Fort Worth, Texas, and for one year was its president. He was president of the Baptist Educational convention of Texas for twelve years. He is at present pastor of the largest colored church in the country, a church of over 9000 members.

Three Fold Purpose

The purpose of this convention is threefold: to translate the Indianapolis convention, at which over seven thousand students from colleges throughout the country attended last Christmas, into terms of local college life; to consider our relations to certain critical problems which are disturbing the peace and unity of the world; and to consider whether Christianity is the best solution of these problems.

In order to achieve these ends, the entire management of the conference is in the hands of students. After each of the addresses by outside speakers, opportunities will be given the students to ask questions from these authorities. After the convention a vote will be taken on the subjects discussed

to find out how the students stand on these big problems.

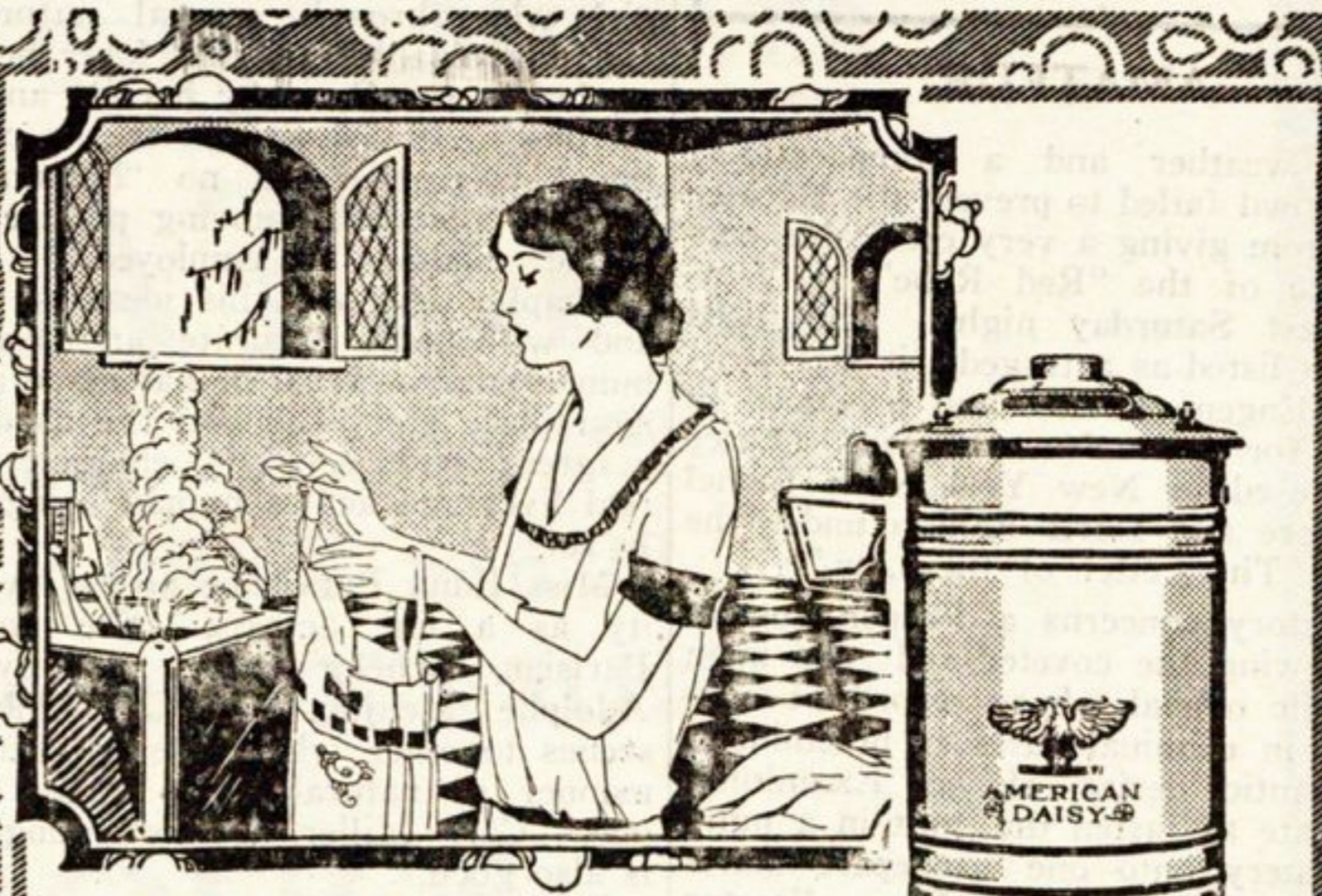

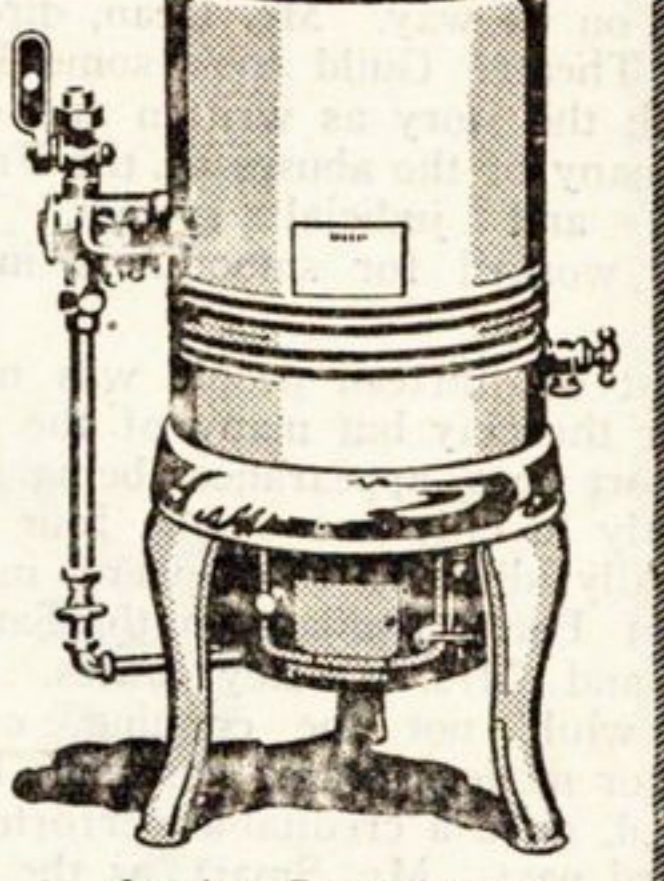
