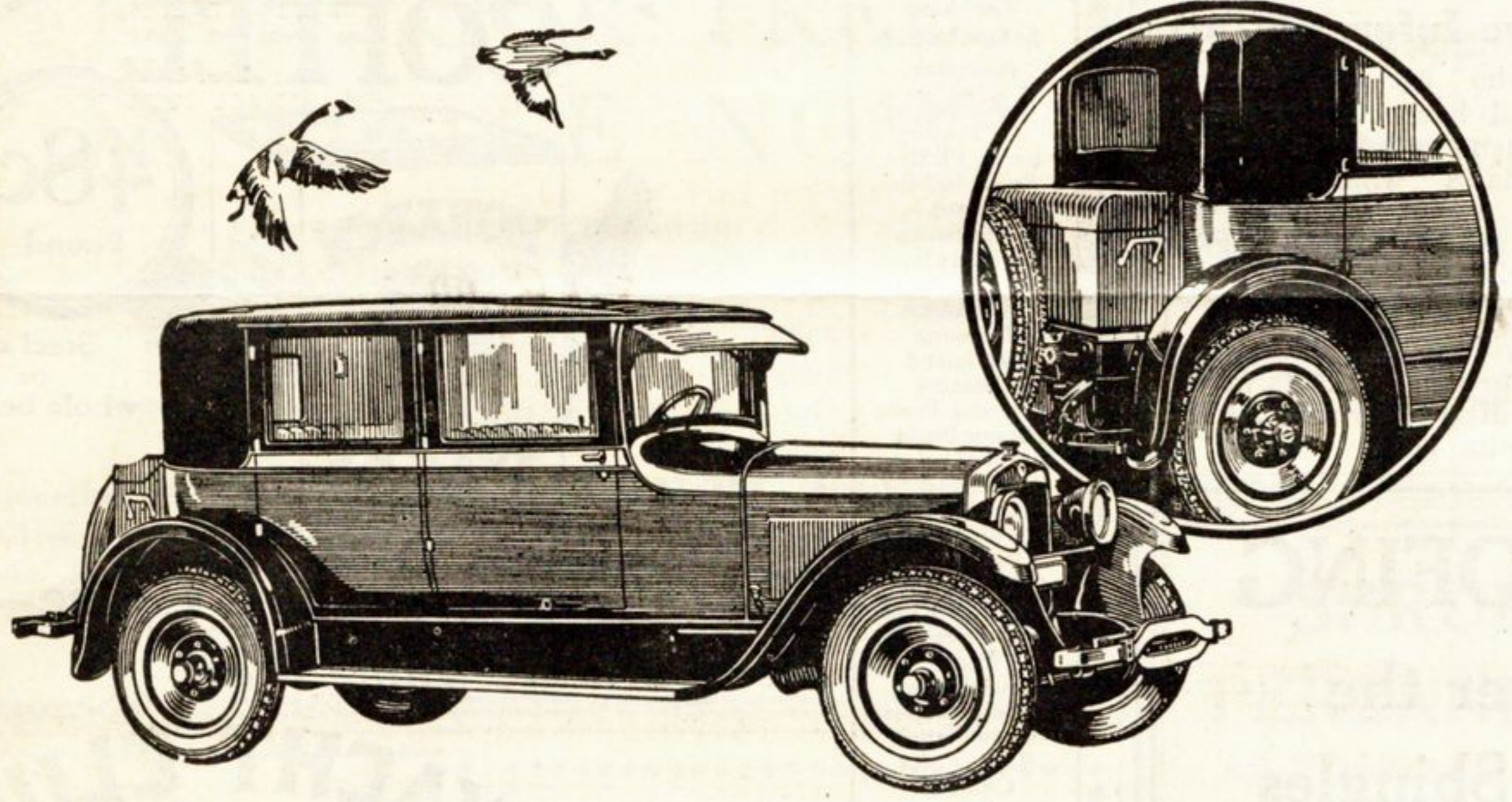
Mrs. Howard Fenton and her mother, Mrs. Carpenter, who have been in Europe since January 1, are expected to return to Winnetka the latter part of May.
