Last of all comes summer—weaving garlands, full-blown blossoms, and the crowning of Flora, Queen of Summer, an honor given by vote of the students to the girl whom they believe best represents the spirit of the college.

Miss Louise St. John Westervelt is in charge of the music for the festival, while the pageant itself, with its attractive costuming and staging are under the direction of Miss Etta Mount and Miss Margaret Farrar.
