New Trier Summer School Sessions Closed Friday

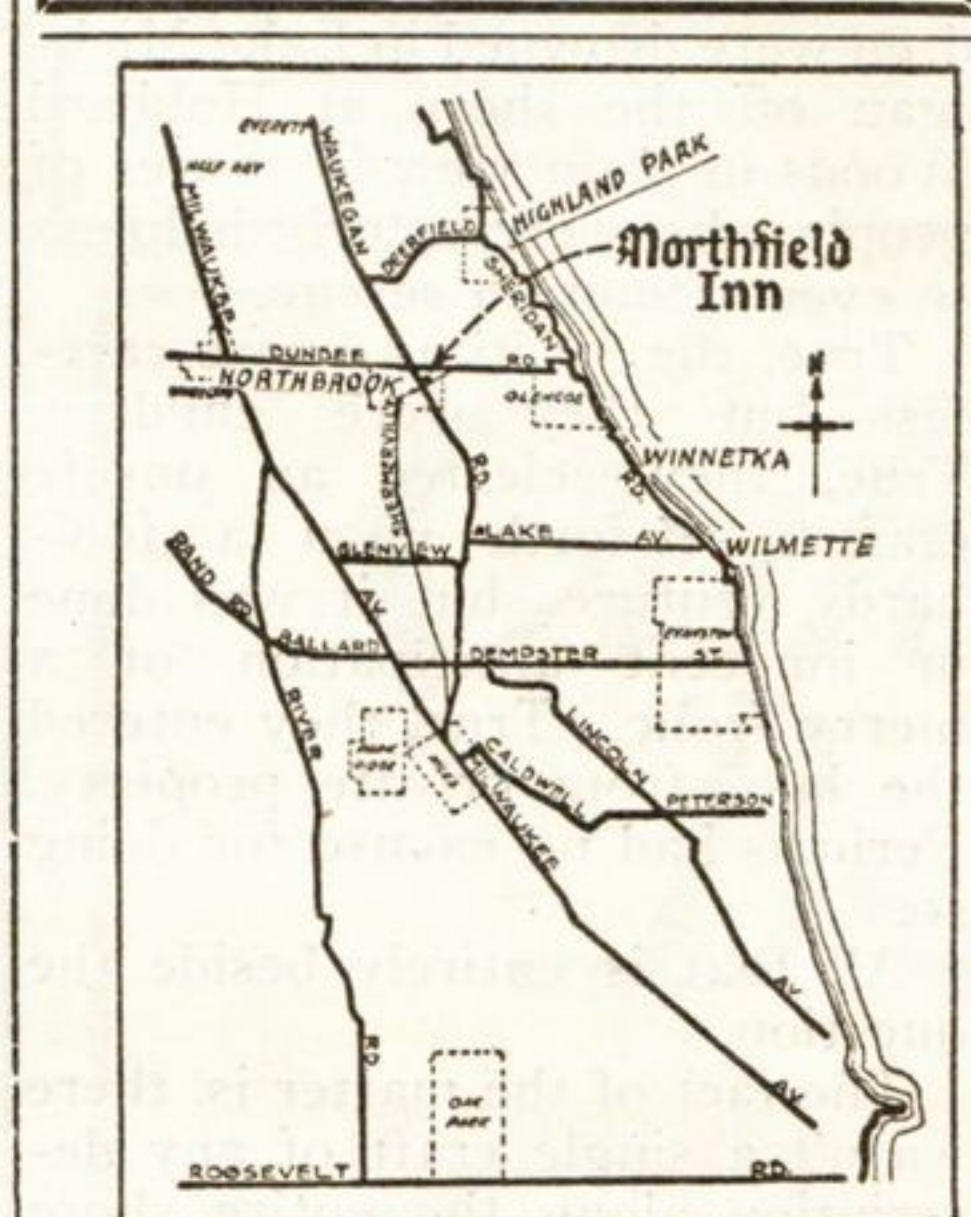
Summer school sessions at New Trier Township High school terminated Friday of this week, thus bringing to a close the most successful vacation study period in the history of the secondary school.
