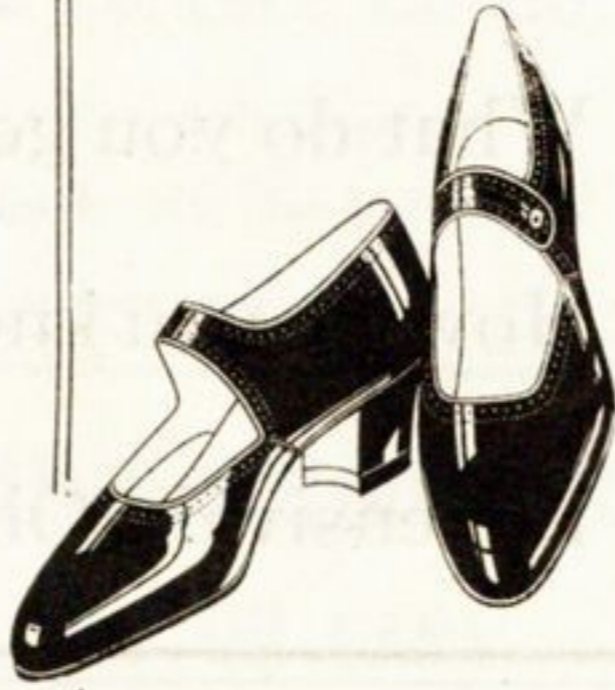

Between the hours of 2 and 4 members of the Pathe Picture company will take moving pictures.

The appointments are remaining as they were until after the bazaar. A musical program will be given during the tea hour, one number of which will be a Greek Dance played on two pianos, Mrs. Archibald Freer's own composition. David Bispham calendars and 50 of his Victrola records, a donation, will be on sale at the David Bispham table in charge of Mrs. Howard Tracy, of Winnetka, chairman of the membership committee.

A dinner-dance with special entertainment will conclude the day. Tickets for this affair may be procured at the hotel.
