"FOR RENT: Furnished kitchenette apartment. Call at No. So and

So, on So and So street." Such is the gist of numberless classified want ads run in the newspapers of large cities, proving that thousands of people want to be by themselves in an apartment, but don't want the trouble or expense of furnishing one—that is, until the pay check holds a much larger figure. It is said by people who make a practice of furnishing flats to rent that they never have a bit of trouble in renting them for the flats are snatched up as soon as they are advertised. It is man's inborn nature to want a home, but he sometimes is pretty timid about starting to acquire the worldly goods, which go into making a home, and so takes a long time before commencing his inquiry as to what inexpensive furnishings can be had. When he does begin his shopping for the cherished home, he and his fiancee, or his bride, or wife of several years' standing, should take a second look at the attractive fiber reed furniture which has probably been shown them. And if he does a little figuring he can always

come to the conclusion that some of these fiber reed furnishings can be used in nearly every room in the house, and the expense doesn't mount up to a great sum after all.  
**Charming for Living Room**  
In the living room, practically everything can be of fiber reed. There can be a very comfortable davenport, and one or two armchairs, one or two small "occasional" chairs, and even a living room table and a desk. The fiber reed can be stained in a rich mahogany finish if one wants it to be so, and the seat cushions can be of something not too colorful. With these pieces a delightful color scheme can be worked out when the draperies, rugs and wall coverings are chosen.  
More power to the sun room when the living room is done in fairly dark tones. The fiber reed pieces for the sun room can be a riot of bright color, the fiber itself stained and painted in any color you wish, and the cushions made of a jolly cretonne or a striped material. Care should be taken not to overcrowd the sun room, but there

usually will be space enough for a chaise lounge and one or two chairs and a table. Don't forget that ferneries and plant stands belong in the sun room, as they do in every room you have, so you may plan these of fiber reed also.  
The comfort of your bedrooms can be materially added to, if you place a fiber reed chair lounge or an extra armchair in each of them. Sometimes that desk which you have so long desired to have in the privacy of your own room may be had if again you decide on fiber reed. And if your children are lucky enough to have a playroom or nursery all their own, it can be made extremely attractive with cheerful pieces of fiber reed.  
**FRAMED PHOTOS**  
Portraits—if they are good portraits—are as desirable today as they have ever been. They are beautiful as works of art, and excellent as part of the furnishing of the home. Although few of us can afford to have portraits of our fam-

ily painted by an artist whose work is worthy, still it is now possible to have portrait-photographs made by photographers of standing who put into their work much of the human charm and characteristics of the sitter. A photograph of this exceptional kind, enlarged perhaps, and tastefully framed, may well be a most ornamental feature of the wall decorations of a room. In general, however, the family photographs are better placed in the more intimate rooms of the house—the bedrooms of those to whom they are dear, or the study, rather than in the living room or hall, where we receive our guests.
