Over Future Plans**

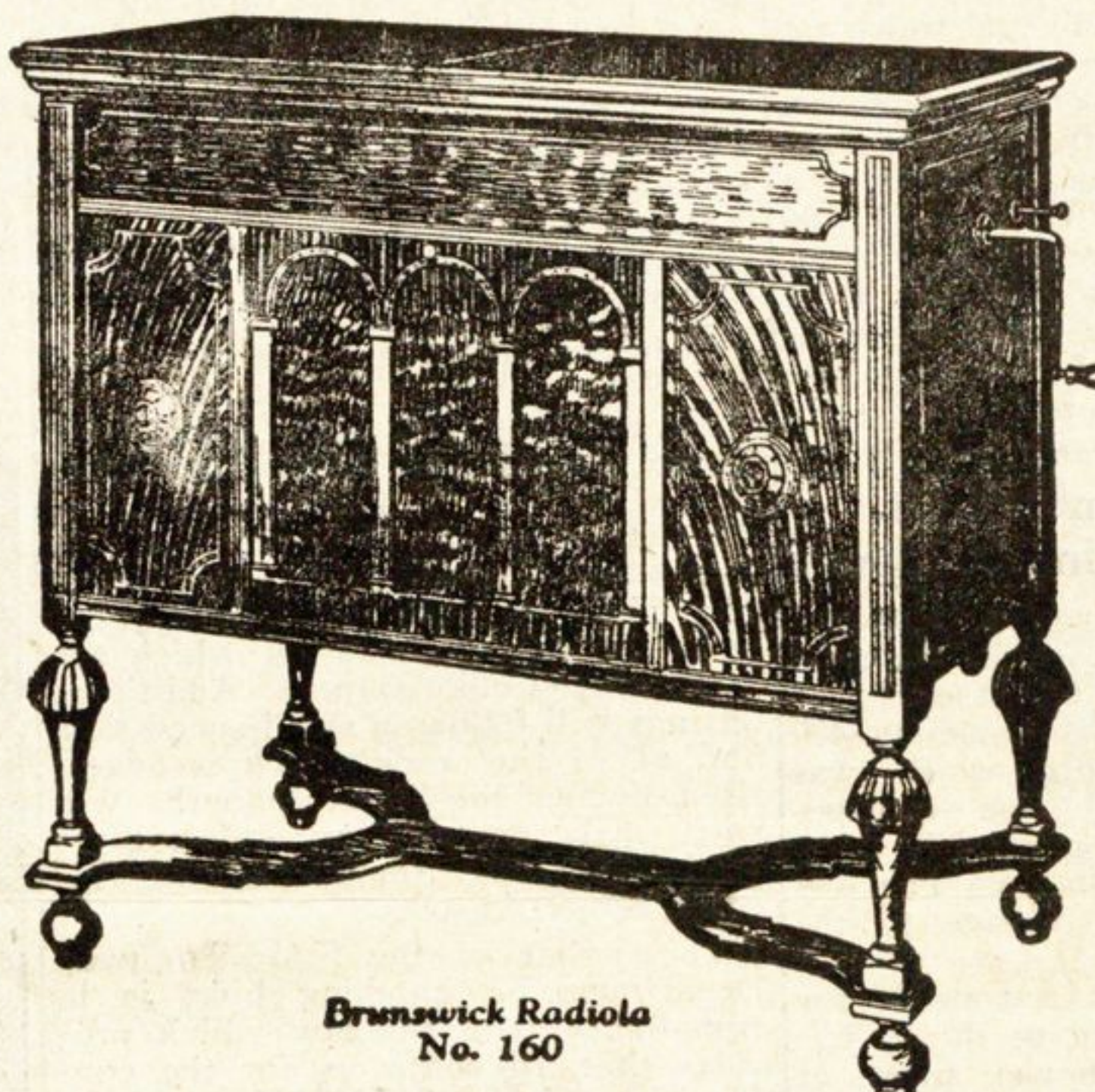
