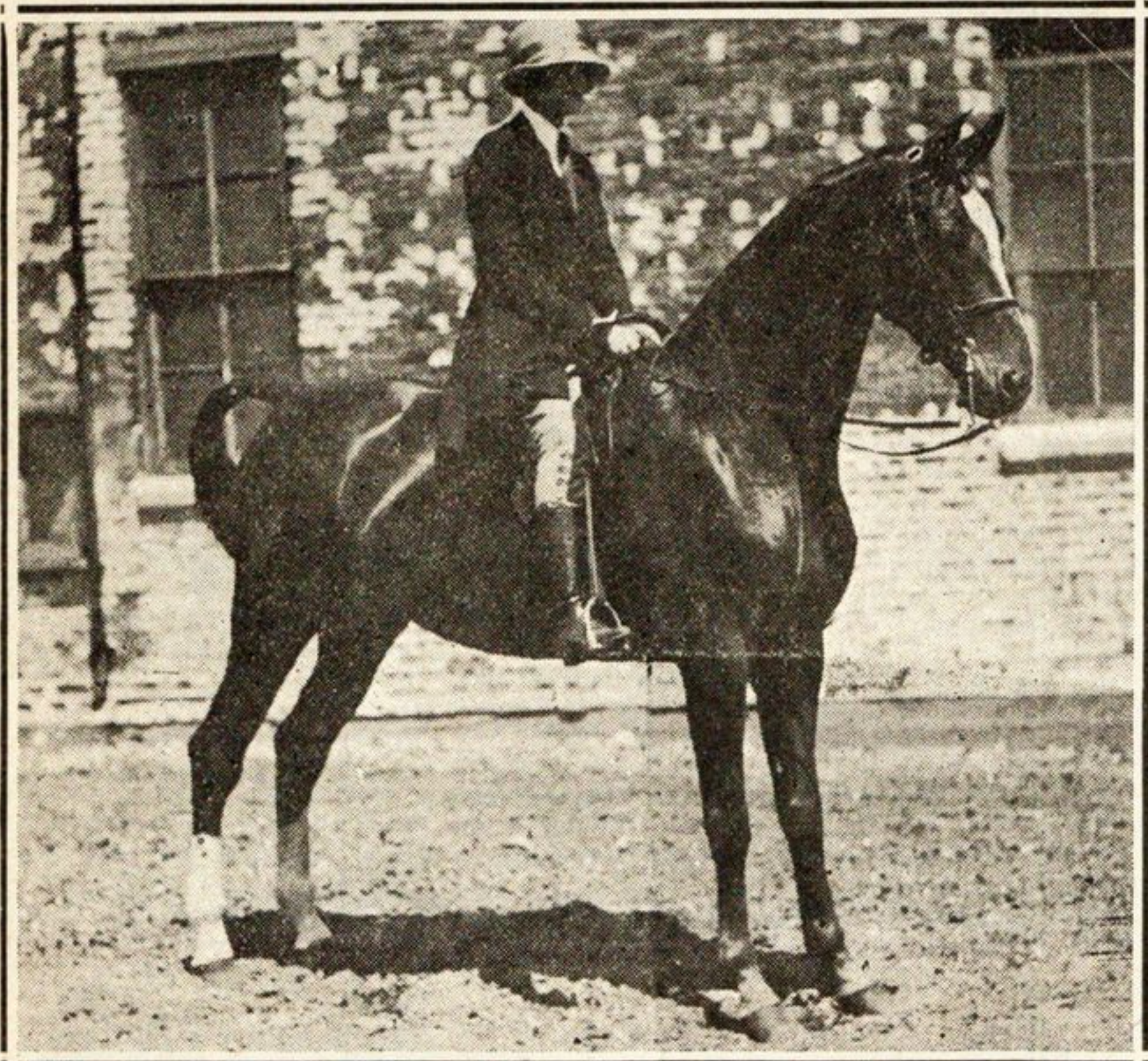


# Blue Ribbon Horse Annexes New Honors at Chicago Show

This show, the biggest in the country, has over 200 entrants, and is continuing throughout the week.

Glittering Glory and Rose of Virginia make their home at the Spur and Saddle club when they are not exhibited in various parts of the country, and at the time of going to press, have been the biggest winners for the club which is itself carrying off the greatest number of ribbons of any entrant.
