The Foxdale Avenue circle will meet at the home of A. J. Rudolph of 856 Foxdale avenue, next Tuesday.

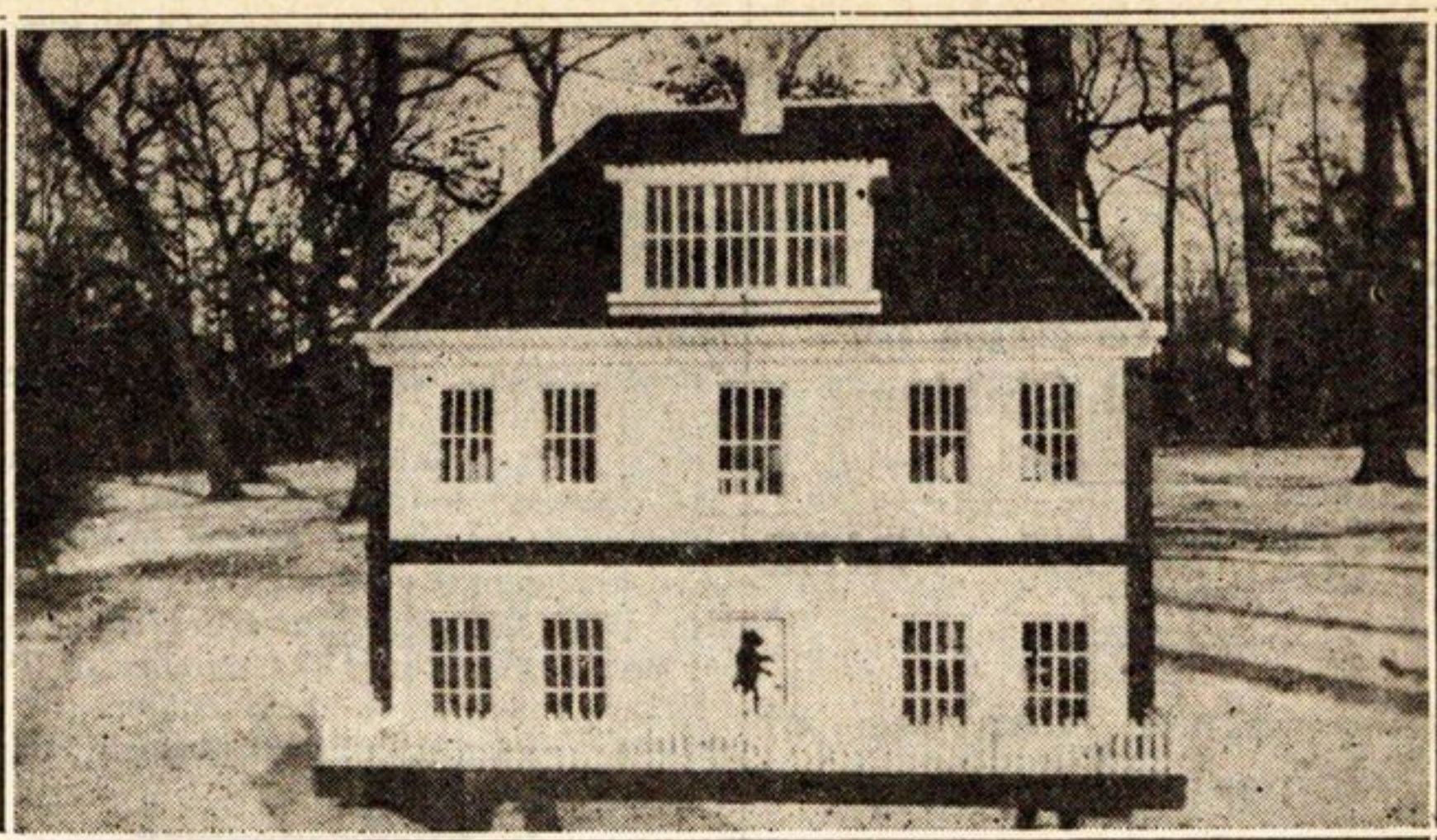
Mr. and Mrs. William Hartshorn and baby of 1025 Oak street have left for Florida, where they will stay for the remainder of the winter.

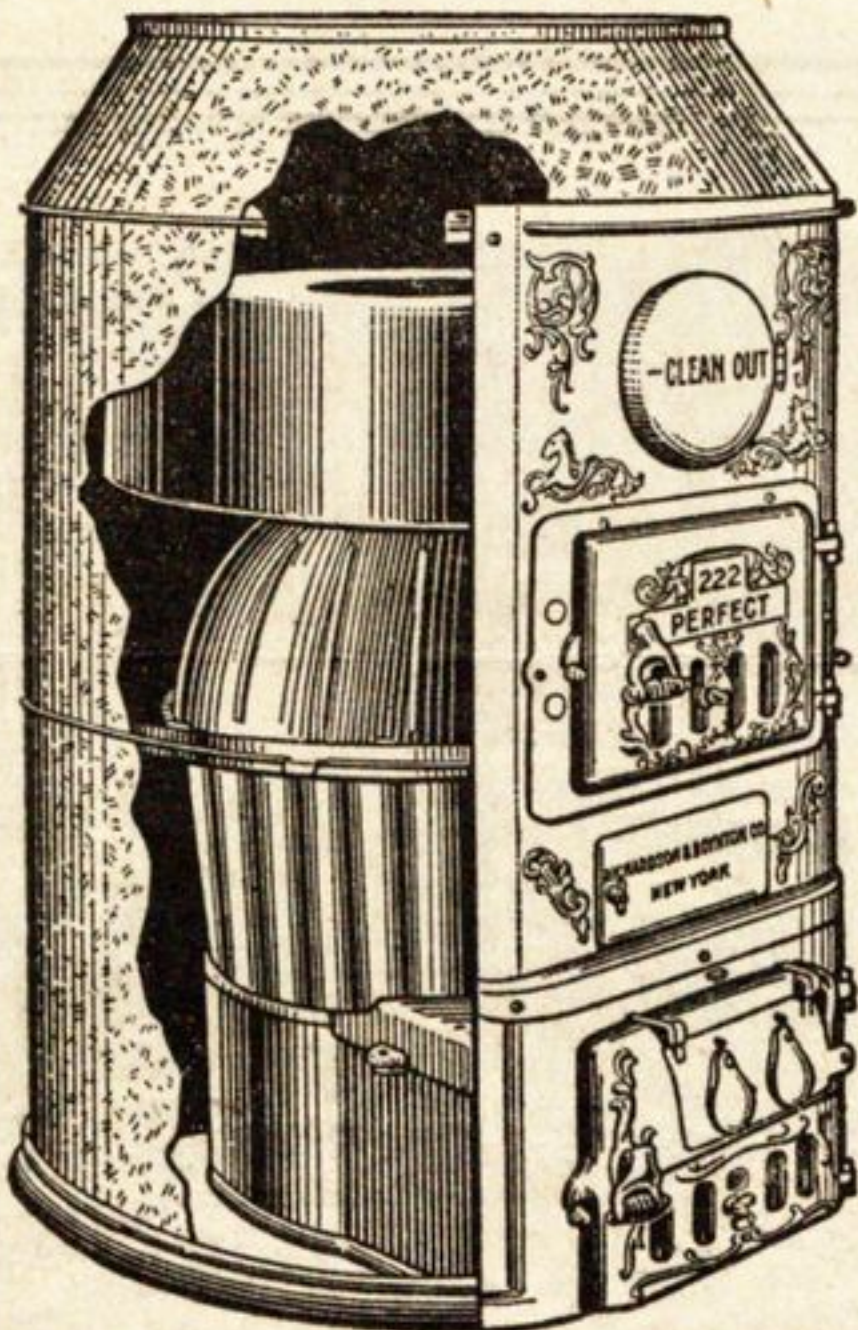
