This play will be followed by Arnold Bennett's and E. Knoblock's "Milestones," March 11 and 12 and Besier's "Don," in April.

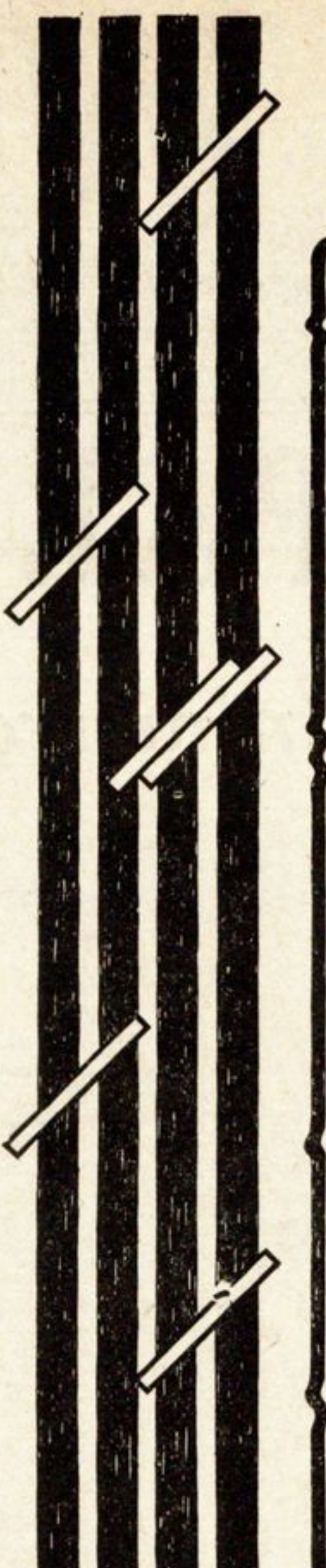

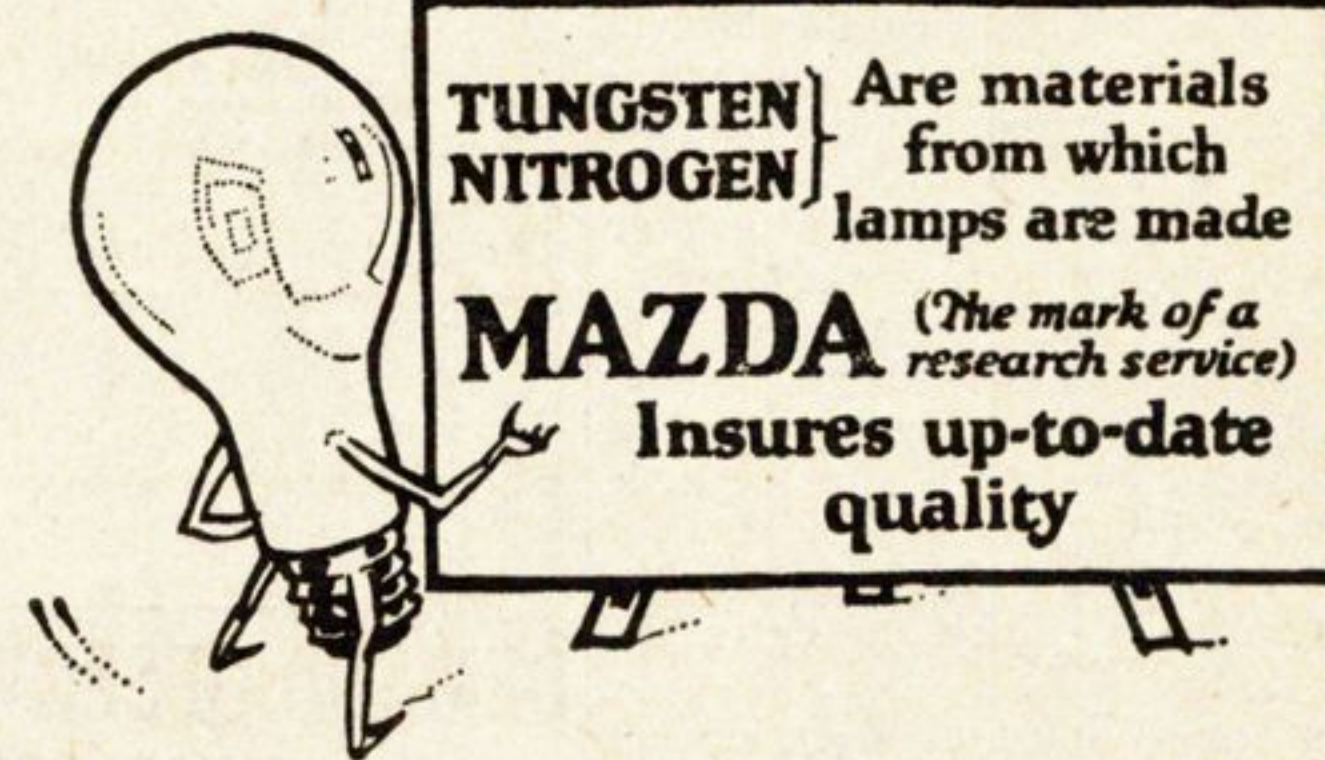
