Mr. Brinkman was lauded by Edward Moore in the Tribune after his appearance as soloist with the Chicago Symphony on December 4 and 5 of this season when he won "the most spontaneous, the most hearty, and the longest continued applause given to any soloist of the season."

The reputations of these two men as leaders among the young artists in Chicago had aroused the interest of the audience and their playing on Thursday more than came up to expectations.

Mr. Quick played with a warm, rich tone and perfect intonation. His playing was mature and revealed a sense of exquisite refinement.

Mr. Brinkman appeared both as composer and pianist. His compositions were highly interesting, particularily to those familiar with the modern idiom. Mr. Brinkman's selections afforded him an opportunity to display his versatility as an interpreter. The Strauss Reverie revealed a beautiful singing tone and the difficult Rachmaninoff B flat prelude was played with a brilliancy of technique which proved him a pianist of the highest order.



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
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
