\$12,000 SET AS THE GOAL

Governors Tell of Center's Activities

Has Community House made good? It is 14 years old and residents have long since decided whether or not it deserves support and continuance. If use is any measure of approval, the governing board believes the village wants the "House" maintained; for more than one million is the attendance record since it was built in 1911.

Sunday, April 5, will find 15 zone teams, of six to 12 men each, visiting their neighbors to obtain pledges for 1925 operating expenses. Clubs Offer Assistance Two of the organiza use Community House ha volunteers to serve as convassers. These are the British-American society and the Rotary club. The litter captained by B. W. Blow, will call on merchants and professional men and enlist their support.

The amount sought, \$12,000, is about one-half of the total budget year, the remainder being already provided by an earlier campaign About 1,400 people will be seen, and an attempt made to secure a large number of new contributors. Old subscribers will be asked for a small increase, as the cost of operation has increased with the volume of service rendered since the new building was erected. "We want to give service as well as to get funds," say the governors.

Citizens Receive Letter

In a letter addressed to potential contributors and mailed yesterday, the governors remind readers of the character of the institution in the following terms:

"Community House belongs to the whole village of Winnetka. It serves all individuals and groups who need it, without distinction as to church attendance, location or social affiliation. It offers to men, women and children opportunities for recreation, for gymnasium exercise, for club work and many sorts of group activity. It affords a meeting place for village organizations. It promotes characterbuilding programs for young people, such as Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls, Pathfinders and Blue Birds. It houses the Community Drama club,

Pleasure club and other national so- of work. cieties. It is a meeting place for club, the Woman's society of the Congregational church, the League of Women Voters, the Parent-Teacher association, the Winnetka Public school faculty, the North Shore Art league and others. Conduct English Classes

"It sponsors and carries on classes in English for foreigners, and Americanization work. It organized and maintains Friendship Circle (a large group of girls working in Winnetka homes). It is the only place where motion pictures are shown regularly in the village, and it aims to give only the best which can be obtained. Its doors are open from 7:30 in the morning until midnight, six days a week, and often on Sundays. There are times when it buzzes all day long, like the proverbial bee-hive. All this is in addition to gymnasium classes for men, women and children, dancing classes, basketball, baseball and other gymnasium activities.

"It radiates a spirit of kindliness, and it stands for helpfulness, neighborliness and finer citizenship. Community House has been called 'The friendly heart of Winnetka.'

Essential to Community "To those Winnetkans who know Community House, its usefulness is more fully understood when they try to picture how Winnetka would seem without it. It wouldn't be Winnetka.

"To the newcomers, an invitation is extended to come and get acquainted. If you feel a stranger in the village, a good way to take root is to learn to know Community House, and to become interested in its activities and what it has to offer.

Gives Chance to Help

"To all the village, an opportunity is given to help in its various activities, as well as to enjoy them, and to ally one's self with its work. During the past year one hundred and five volunteer workers have given regular, definite service in Community Housesome weekly, some monthly. This is in addition to a large corps of volun-


