LIGHT VOTE POLLED IN TOWNSHIP BALLOT

Estimates indicate that 3200 votes were cast in the township election held Tuesday, April 7, which resulted in a sweeping victory for the New Trier Citizens league ticket over Ralph H. and Raymond E. Fjellman, running for the office of constable on an independent ticket, its only opposition. Of these votes, 2800 were cast in Winnetka, and 190 in Glencoe. Figures for other towns are not yet avail- able. The heavy vote in Winnetka was attributable to the concurrent and hotly contested village election which brought out a record vote.

Those candidates who were elected to office were five justices of the peace. D. M. Mickey, John J. Peters, Samuel H. Vowell, George W. Tapper, Jr., and Ralph E. Sinsheimer, five constables, Jacob Rudolph, Walter Gregory, Peter Schildgen, Joseph A. Sheppard, Leo M. Dean, and two township school trustees, J. Edward Maass and Walter T. Fisher.

The Fjellman brothers, who were de- feated for the offices of constable, ex- pressed their thanks to those who sup- ported them at the polls.

Complimentary Ballots in Kenilworth Elections

Kenilworth will hold a school elec- tion tomorrow and its village election Tuesday, April 21. The candidates for the positions of school trustees, to be voted on tomorrow, are Mrs. Craig Ketcham and William Lodwick. Ar- thur T. McIntosh, president of the school board will be up for re-election.

In the village election the candidates will be James C. Murray for presi- dent; C. D. Howe, E. M. Sweet and I. C. Darling for trustees. Three propositions in regard to tak- ing over and operating the village water plant will also be voted upon. The plant is at present operated by the estate of Joseph C. Sears. There is no opposition in either the school or village election.
