Hubbard Woods Station Park Gets a Clean-up

Hubbard Woods station park has been cleaned up and more than 900 shrubs and trees have been planted there in the last two weeks under the direction of the Hubbard Woods Improvement as-

sociation, of which Stanley P. Farwell is president. This is in line with the plan of the association to beautify the station park and keep it so.

A large number of citizens who live in the neighborhood turned out Saturday before last, when an old fashioned planting bee was held, and set out most of the shrubs and trees and made cinder walks. The association had collected about \$500 for this purpose and part of this amount was expended for trees and shrubs. Professional gardeners were retained to complete the work of the citizens and it is practically finished at this time.

Mr. Farwell stated that plans were a-foot to enlist a committee of citizens, which may include some of the younger members of the community to keep the park "policed" and methodically pick

up all rubbish. Further contributions will be very acceptable, according to Mr. Farwell, who says that it is the policy of the Hubbard Woods Improvement association to keep up the good work in the station park and surroundings.

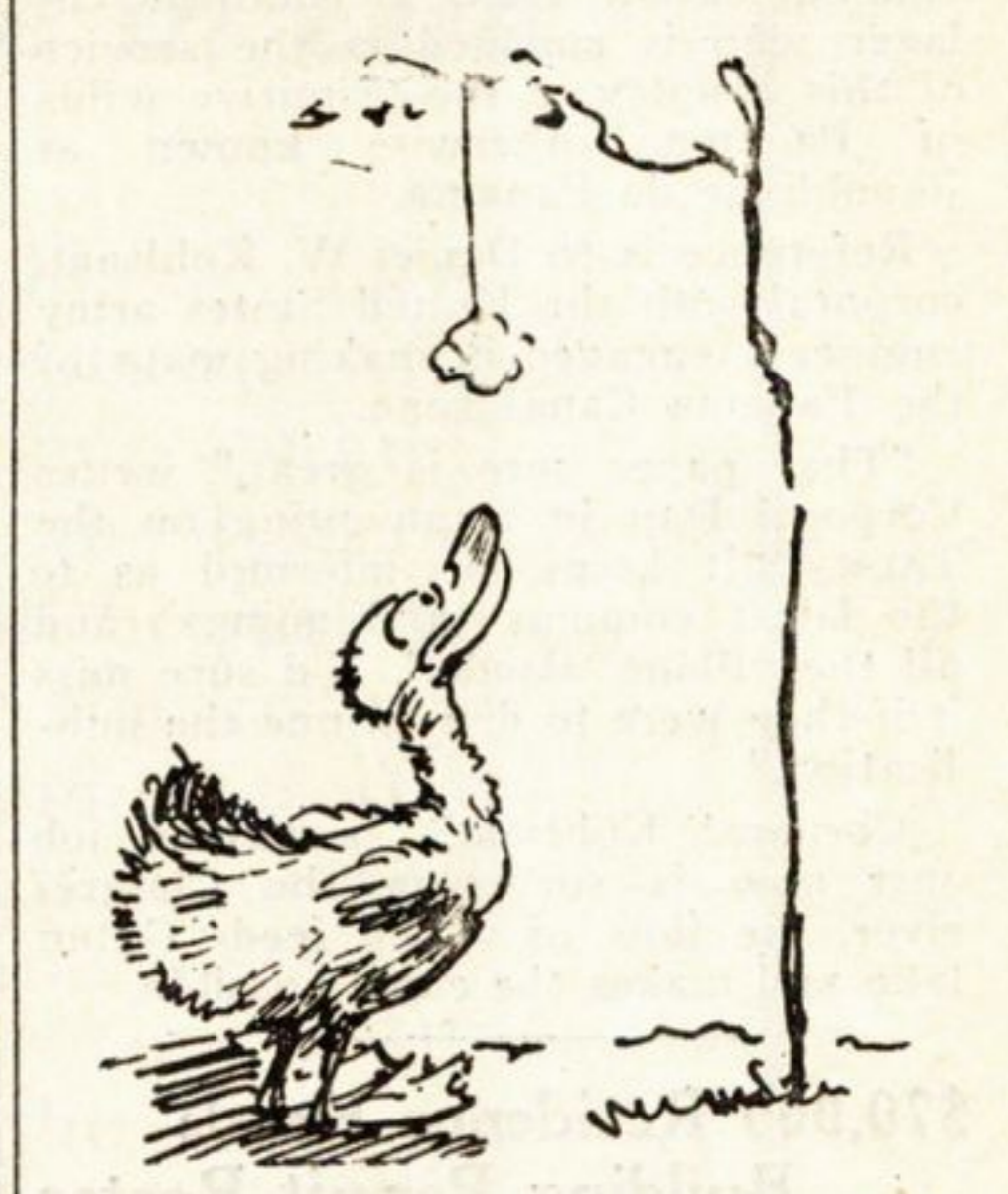
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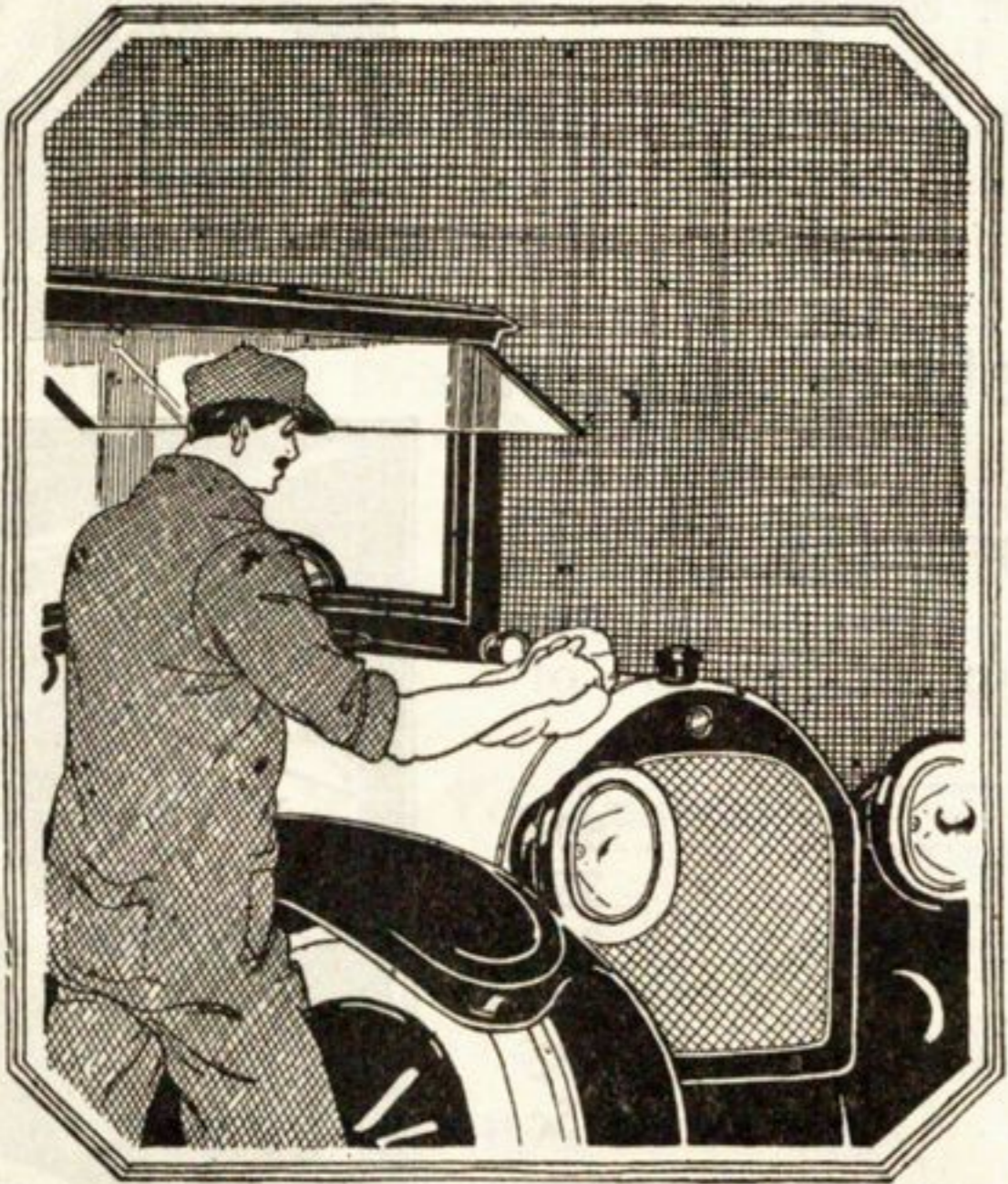
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
