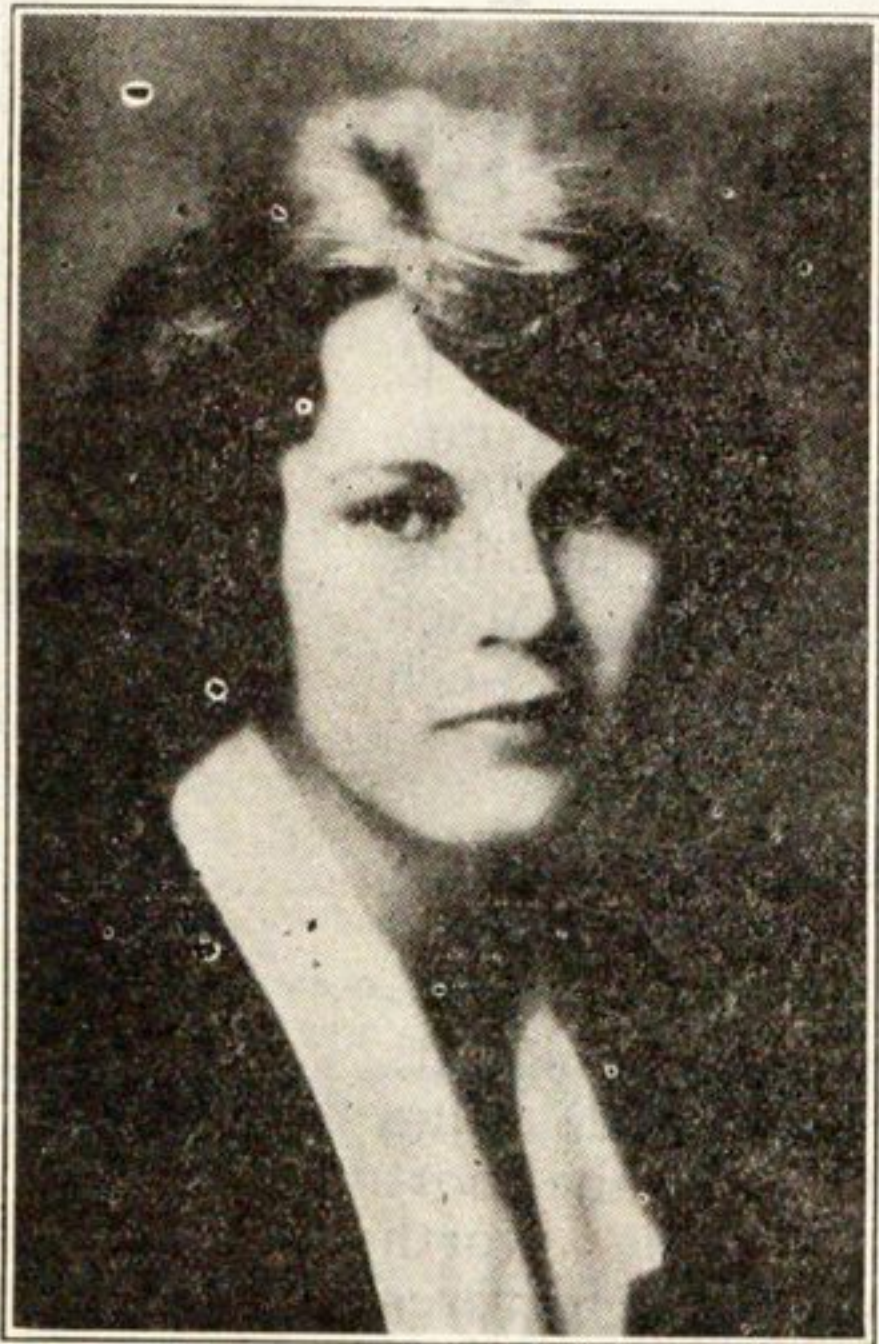


# Buell-Pope Wedding to Be Event of Saturday
