Skokie Club Ready for Open Day Next Monday



TUESDAY morning of this week, a field of about 70 golfers teed-off at 9 o'clock, in the opening round of the annual medal play championship tournament of the Woman's Western Golf association, held at Riverside.

Most of the good players in the middle west appeared on the entry list. Mrs. S. L. Reinhart of Dallas, Texas, was the first to play off Tuesday to defend her title as one of the best medal players in the country. She was paired with Mrs. Melvin Jones of Olympia Fields, who is the north and south champion, and the woman's city champion.

Other players of note included Mrs. Joseph Francis Horn (Miriam Burns) winner of the championship of the Woman's Western in 1923, who is entering from Westmoreland; Mrs. Homer Dixon of Indian Hill; Mrs. Lee W. Mida of Butterfield, Mrs. Jay Carsriel of Aurora; and Mrs. J. W. Douglass of Barrington Hills.

EXPECT GREAT THROGS FOR LIBERTYVILLE 4TH

Everything is arranged for the big Fourth of July celebration at Libertyville, which will hold over two days and include Sunday, July 5. A large number of horses from Hawthorne, Church-hill Downs, Aurora and Latonia have already been entered by their owners and several prominent jockeys will be at the track.

In between the racing, of which there will be six events daily, there will be a number of circus and hippodrome acts presented by the Robinson Attractions of Chicago. These will include the world famous equestrienne, Madame Bedini and her school of educated horses. In addition there will be the Australian Waites, whip crackers extraordinary, Rose Ellis and Rose, from the Orpheum and Keith circuits of vaudeville and six or seven other circus features.

Two baseball games are scheduled for Saturday and Sunday. One between the Chicago Union Giants and Libertyville and the Mc Henry team will play Libertyville on Saturday.

A large number of rising devices and other amusement features will be on the grounds and each night a mammoth display of fireworks by the Gordon Fireworks company of Chicago, will be staged.

Visitors will find plenty of grand accommodation an additional 1,000 seats having been constructed. Parking on the grounds has been seen to, and a corps of men will be there to take charge of the cars. Picnickers will find the fair grounds a pleasant place to spend the day and all accommodations for their comfort have been arranged for.

The celebration will be all day long, starting in the morning and not ending until a late hour each night.


