Three entrants of especial local prominence went on for the event, namely Miss Dorothy Klotz of Indian Hill club, holder of the Chicago City championship, her sister, Mrs. Robert C. Bennett, also of Indian Hill, and Mrs. Joseph F. Horn, (Miriam Burns) a member of Westmoreland and champion in 1923.

Other entrants from Chicago, whose playing is known to north shore golfers are Mrs. Lee Mida of Butterfield; Mrs. Fred C. Letts of Onwentsia, a former title holder, Mrs. Jay S. Bassri of Bryn Mawr, Mrs. J. W. Taylor of Evanston, Mrs. E. E. Harwood of Olympia Fields; Miss Virginia VanWie of Beverly Hills, and Mrs. S. L. Reinhart of Ravisloe. It has been stated that Chicago has the largest representation of any city outside of Minneapolis and St. Paul. The 32 players holding the lowest scores Monday, qualified for the match play that is continuing throughout the week, with the finals Saturday.

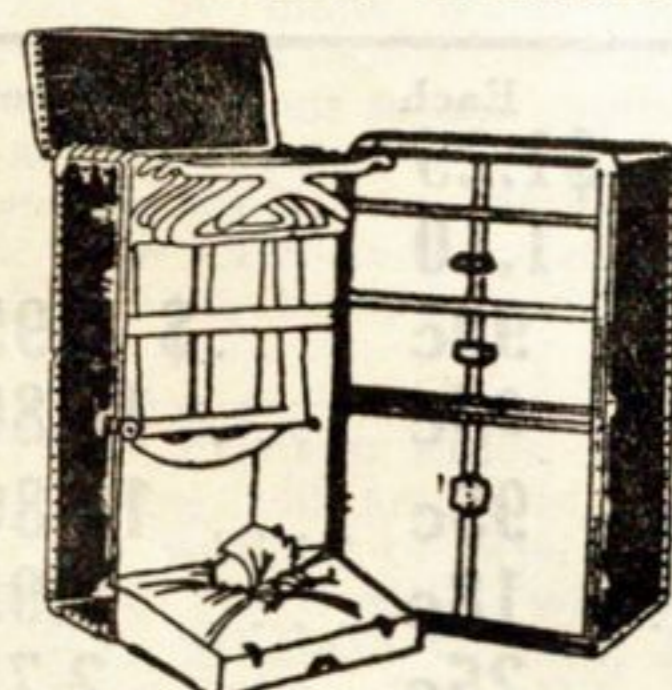

Postpone Next Week's Match at Wilmette Club

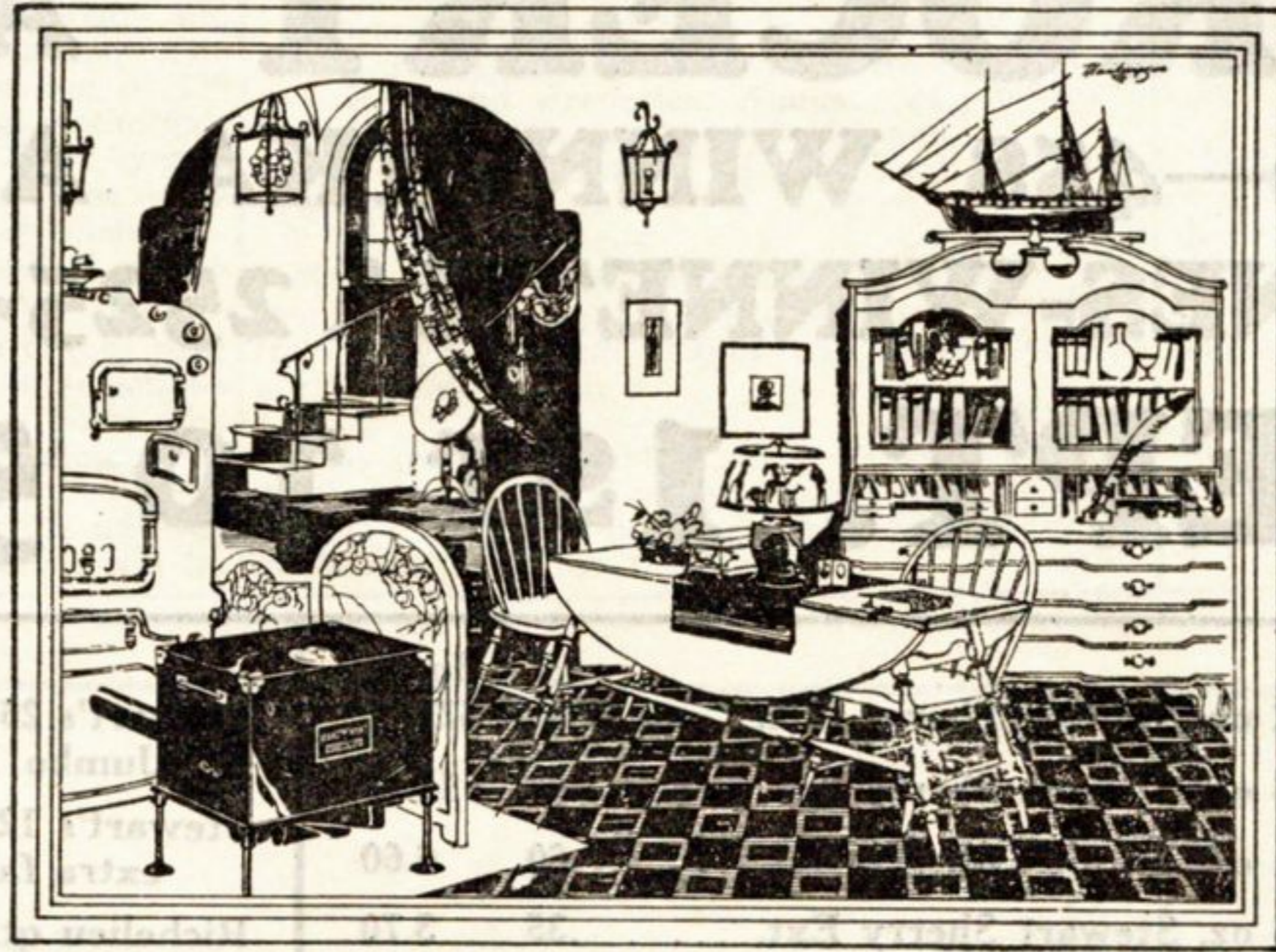
EACH woman player at the Wilmette Golf club started off Thursday of this week with but one club in her hand with which to score for herself in the event planned by the
