The Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, by order duly entered in the above entitled proceedings, having directed that as to such of said defendants as are shown by the affidavit filed in said proceedings, to be non-residents of the State of Illinois, or whose residences are shown thereby to be unknown, and the defendants designated as "All whom it may concern," the Clerk of said Court cause publication to be made in the Winnetka Weekly Talk, a secular newspaper published in Winnetka Park District, County of Cook and State of Illinois, containing notice of the following matters:

Notice is hereby given of the pendency of the above entitled proceedings instituted by the petition of the Winnetka Park District, heretofore filed in the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, designated General Number 424180, in said Court, praying for the ascertainment of the just compensation to be made for the private property to be taken or damaged for the making of the improvement hereinafter described, and for the ascertainment of what property will be benefited by the making of said improvement, and the amount of such benefit.

The Commissioners duly appointed by the said Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, to investigate and report the just compensation to be made for the private property to be taken or damaged for said improvement, and, also, what real estate will be benefited by said improvement, and the amount of such benefit to each parcel of land assessed, duly made a special assessment to raise the cost of such improvement, and filed their said report and assessment roll in the office of the Clerk of said Court on the fourth day of September, A. D. 1925. Thereupon a summons issued out of said Court against the defendants above named, and the defendants described as "All whom it may concern," returnable in said Court at the County Court House in the City of Chicago, County of Cook and State of Illinois, on the sixth day of October, A. D. 1925, as is by law required, which proceeding is now pending.

The total cost of said improvement, as shown by the estimate of the President of the Board of Local Improvements of the said Winnetka Park District, and the report and assessment roll of said Commissioners, is the sum of Two Hundred Sixty-six Thousand, Three Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars and three cents (\$266,339.00).

Now, unless you, such defendants as are shown by the affidavit filed in said proceedings to be non-residents of the State of Illinois, or whose residences are shown thereby to be unknown, and the defendants designated as "All whom it may concern," shall be and appear before the said Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, at the County Court House, in the City of Chicago, County of Cook and State of Illinois, on the sixth day of October, A. D. 1925, and plead, answer or demur to the petitioner's petition, or object to the report and assessment roll of the Commissioners aforesaid, the same and the matters and things therein charged and stated will be taken as confessed, and a judgement entered in accordance with the said report and assessment roll and the prayer of said petition.

The following is a description of the said improvement, and includes a description of the lots, blocks, tracts and parcels of land sought to be taken for the said improvement:

That Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block one (1); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive in Block two (2); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block three (3); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block four (4); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block five (5); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block six (6); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block seven (7); Lots one (1) to fifty (50) inclusive, in Block eight (8); in Andersen's Addition to Glencoe, being a subdivision of the Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section Forty-two (42) North, Range thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian, according to the plat of said subdivision, recorded in the office of the Recorder of Cook County, Illinois, on the 3rd day of January, A. D. 1885, in Book 19 of Plats, at Page 66, as Document No. 597,198, together with any and all interest in and to the land comprised within the streets, alleys and highways or portions thereof adjoining said lots, blocks, tracts and parcels of land in said subdivision, the said lots, blocks, tracts and parcels of land being and including all of the lots, blocks, tracts and parcels of land lying within the boundaries of the said Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section Eighteen (18) Township forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian;

Also: That part of the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section Eighteen (18) in Township forty-two (42) North, Range thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian, that is described as follows: Beginning at the Northwest corner of the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of said section eighteen (18); running thence due South to the point of its intersection with the center line of Prairie Avenue extended west; thence due East along the center line of Prairie Avenue extended west to the point of its intersection with the center line of Bluff Street extended south; thence due North along the center line of Bluff Street extended south to the North line of said Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of said Section Eighteen (18); thence west along the said north line to the point of beginning, including any and all interest in and to the land comprised within the streets, alleys and highways, or portions thereof, adjoining said tract of land, together with all buildings and other structures situated thereon;

Also: That part of the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section Eighteen (18) in Township Forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian that is described as follows: Beginning on the east line of said Northwest Quarter of said Section Eighteen (18) at the point of its intersection with the center line of Prairie Avenue extended west; thence due west to the west line of the Southeast Quarter of the said Northwest Quarter of said Section Eighteen (18); thence south to the Southwest corner of the said Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of the Northwest Quarter; thence east along the south line of said Northwest Quarter to the Southeast corner of said Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter; thence north along the east line of said Northwest Quarter to the point of beginning, including any and all interest in and to the land comprised within the streets, alleys and highways, or portions thereof, adjoining said tract of land;

Also: That part of the Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section Eighteen (18) in Township Forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian that is described as follows: Beginning at the Southeast corner of the Northwest Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of said Section Eighteen (18); thence south along the east line of said Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter to its intersection with the center line of Prairie Avenue extended west; thence due west along the center line of Prairie Avenue extended west to the point of its intersection with the center line of Bluff Street extended south; thence due north along the center line of Bluff Street extended south to the north line of said Southeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of said Section Eighteen (18); thence west along the north line of said Southeast Quarter to the point of beginning, including any and all interest, in and to the land comprised within the streets, alleys and highways, or portions thereof, adjoining said tract of land.

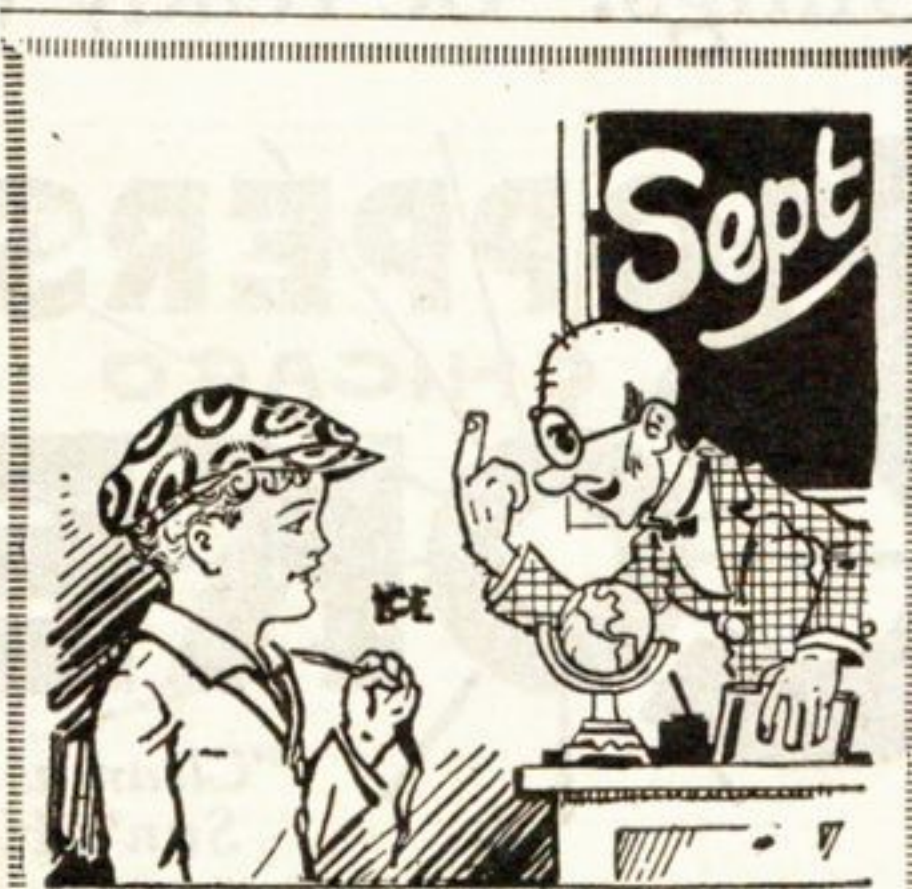

BIG GRID YEAR**

**Three Important Games  
Booked for Stadium**

- October 3—Nebraska at Illinois (Boy Scout day)

Three big games scheduled for the Memorial Stadium give indications that the 1925 University of Illinois football team will probably play before the largest football crowds in history.

Illinois meets Nebraska, Michigan, and Chicago at home. Nebraska plays there October 3, in the big early season attraction of the Middle West. A record crowd for an opening game is predicted when Coach Zuppke's eleven lines up against the Huskers, coached by Ernest E. Bearg, Zuppke's assistant for four years.

Michigan will again be the Homecoming foe on October 24, and Chicago comes on November 7, which will be Dad's Rotary, Kiwanis and A. B. C. day. Capacity crowds are expected for both games, although tickets probably will be available up to the last minute. Illinois also plays Butler and Wabash in the Stadium. "Pat" Page's Bulldogs always drew well and Wabash is said to have good prospects. Both contests should draw nearly 25,000 spectators.

Illinois will be the big attraction in the East October 31, when it meets the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia. Illinois will also be a big Homecoming drawing card at Iowa City, on October 17, and at Ohio State November 21.

**New Trier Now Has  
New Football Field**

A new football field will greet the gridiron fans of the north shore when New Trier opens its season of play on its home field with Lakeview high school of Chicago as its first opponent.

Last spring the entire field was plowed up and sowed with a new kind of grass which has been found to have superior wearing qualities to the usual varieties used. It is similar to that now being used on golf courses and quickly repairs itself when torn up. Those who recalled the handicaps of the home team last year when mud running featured some of the rainy-day games can expect a faster field this year.

New steel bleachers are being erected to seat 1,000 fans and better provisions are being made to handle the crowds. With five of its seven scheduled games listed for playing on the New Trier field, and bright prospects for a good team, it is expected that more interest will be attracted this year than ever before.
