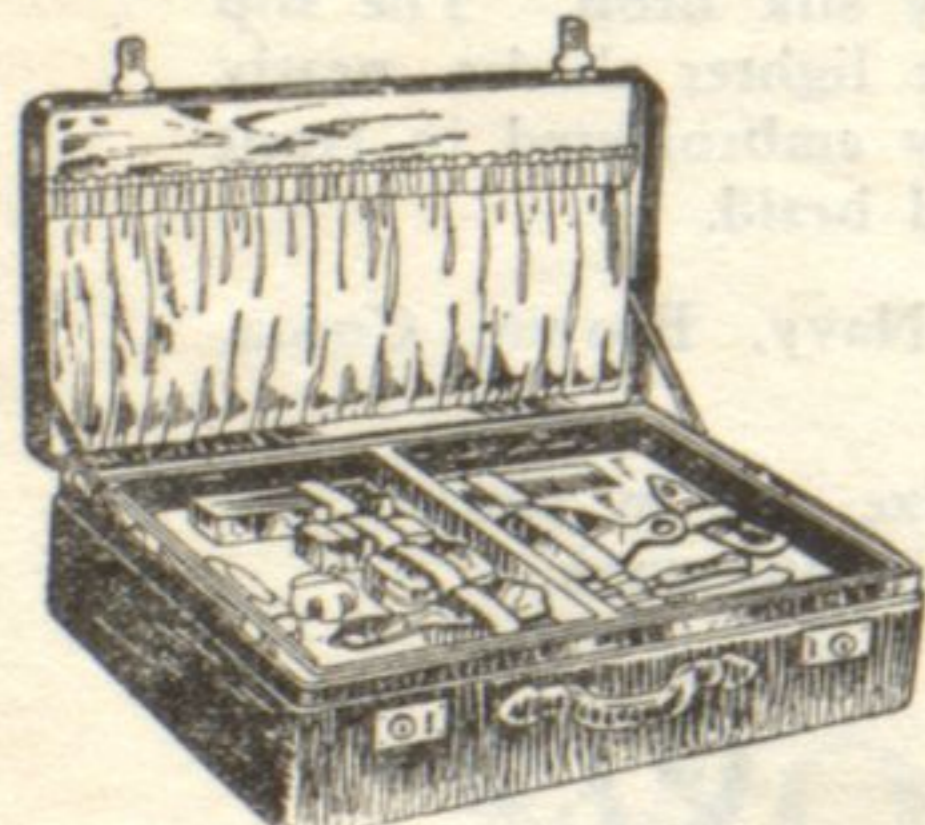


mendation have been received from clubs, churches, art societies and students.
