N., chairman of the convention program committee, in commenting on the North Shore line first aid work following the demonstration, said: "It is surely a decided contribution to the useful education of our citizens for your company to disseminate such training among the employes of your organization."

Mabel McClenahan, R. N., former chairman of the Public Health section of the association, commending the girls for their excellent showing, said: "This is certainly a good piece of work in the Public Health field."

The feature of North Shore Line First Aid work is its progressiveness. Seven men's teams have been graduated, and the eighth team is now in training. Other girls' teams will follow the one which has just completed its training.
