business pursuits. The reservist is caused no expense, and expenses incident to training are paid by the government. Technical text book instruction on military tactics and current regulations are furnished from various service schools and the reserve officer or enlisted man is thus enabled to keep himself familiarized at all times. This is very beneficial, needless to say, in event of war, were he called upon.

Technical specialists and non-commissioned officers by such Reserve Corps enlistments are given every opportunity to avail themselves for appointment as 2nd lieutenants.

The commanding officer of the 159th Brigade Machine Gun Squadron is anxious to complete enlistments, especially for vacancies in Staff and Troop "N. C. O.'s" and requests all men of military age (18 to 45 years) interested in this patriotic duty to submit their application to 405 W. Van Buren street, Chicago, or 347 Oak Circle, Wilmette. Information will be cheerfully and fully furnished regarding reserve corps regulations.

It is of interest to know that a Cavalry division consists of: headquarters staff and special troops; two cavalry brigades (two regiments each); one field artillery battalion (horse); one combat engineer battalion (mounted); officers, 18 warrant officers and 6950 one division train; attached medical department and chaplains; total of 394 enlisted men. A full complement of commissioned officers have already been secured with many applications on waiting list from veterans of the World war. The division has also many "enlisted reservists" and the officers are now selecting from its "enlisted personnel" and applicants for enlistment, those who are eligible for "specialists" appointments, non-commissioned officers, etc. In case of a national (military) emergency or hostilities, this division would fill its ranks from enlisted men drawn from the VI Corps area, namely, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin.

Solve Radio Fan's Battery Troubles With Novel Device

Announcement was made this week by The Electric Storage Battery company, of a new product that will prove of exceptional interest to radio fans. It was described as the Exide Radio Power Unit—"the battery that is always charged."

The new device is on display at the Winnetka Exide Battery Service.

The Exide Radio Power Unit is expected to provide just the source of filament current that thousands of fans are clamoring for—a device that gives one all the advantages of the storage battery with practically no care or attention. It consists of a metal container very attractively finished in a rich mahogany color. Within it, is a compact Exide Battery specially designed for the purpose, and a charging device directly connected to the battery. A length of wire running from the end of the unit is fitted with a plug which is intended to be screwed

into any lamp socket or floor receptacle and kept connected at all times.

On the end of the Power Unit are two binding posts marked "A' Battery Plus" and "A' Battery Minus." To these posts are fastened the "A" plus and minus connections of the radio set. Just above these binding posts, is a

small switch which is thrown up or down according to whether the radio set is in use or not.

After antennae and ground, or loop connections are made, and after the "B" batteries have been connected, the set is ready for operation.

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
