

### Get Exact Amount of Assessment Is Advice of Village

Care in ascertaining the amount due when making special assessment payments was urged by village officials in a statement issued at the Village hall this week. Special care must be used in figuring the amount of the interest, it was said. The statement is as follows:

"The Village office requests that property owners paying special assessments to the Village Collector make certain that the amount of their payment includes the interest on the current installment shown on the special assessment bill.

"This interest is figured on the amount of the current installment from January 2 a year ago to the date when payment is made. For instance, if payment is made on January 15, 1926, the interest should be figured on 12½ months, and added to the amounts shown on the special assessment bill.

"This interest item could not be shown on the bills when rendered, because the Village Collector has no knowledge of the time when property owners expect to pay their assessments.

"Unless the interest on the current installment is computed and added to the bill and included in the remittance, the Village Office will be compelled to return the bill and check to the property owner for correction.

#### A CORRECTION
