### Symphony Players of Chicago Give Next Concerts of Series Tuesday, February 9

In keeping with their announced policy of presenting several distinctive young American artists with the Symphony Players of Chicago during the present season, the officers of the New Trier Township Orchestral association and Conductor George Dasch an nounces the engagement of William Beller, pianist, for the fifth concert of the current series at New Trier High school, Tuesday evening, February 9.

Mr. Beller achieved early recognition with the winning of the Mason and Hamlin piano prize in 1921, and he was recently declared winner in the final contest held at Portland, Ore., biennially by the National Federation of Music clubs, in which hundreds of young American artists competed.
