"We hope that as many Evanston Camp and North Shore Auxiliary members as possible will attend these services, which will be of a highly patriotic and impressive nature.


"The wearing of uniforms while not obligatory, is desirable, but all members of the U.S. W. V. and Auxiliary should wear their membership badges.
