NEW TRAFFIC HIGHWAY CONFERENCE SUBJECT

Regional Planning Boards Confer with North Shore Officials on Road Plan

A meeting held under the auspices of the Chicago Regional Planning association in the Village hall at Wilmette last Wednesday evening, brought forth the fact that much progress has been made since the last meeting, some months ago, in the development of the plans for the new highway through Evanston and the north shore villages. The state, county and various villages most directly interested were well represented, and the discussions were of a helpful and constructive nature.

Prominent among those present were Kendrick Harger, on behalf of the state; Commissioners William Busse and Frederick W. Penfield and Assistant County Highway Engineer, E. C. Wenger, representing Cook county; from Glencoe were Merle B. Waltz, president of the Village board, and H. H. Sherer, village manager; from Winnetka were Robert Kingery, chairman of the zoning board of appeals of Winnetka and secretary of the Chicago Regional Planning association; President J. C. Murray, of Kenilworth; President Earl E. Orner, and Trustees W. W. DeBerard, C. E. Drayer and John F. Wiedlin, of Wilmette, in addition to Robert Stoddard, chairman of the Wilmette Plan Commission, Mrs. Robert Taylor, chairman of the Civic committee of the Wilmette Woman's club, J. J. Moran, chairman of the Civic committee of the Wilmette Chamber of Commerce, Charles H. Jackson, Wilmette village attorney and Charles N. Roberts, Wilmette village engineer. Evanston was represented by H. R. Platt, of the firm of Mayer, Meyer, Austrian and Platt, who represented the Asbury avenue residents.

Residence Oppose Plan

Opposition on the part of the Asbury avenue residents to the extension of the proposed route over that street was met with a proposition to section, in which Mr. Platt consented to give assistance and suggestions.

Mr. Kingery, by aid of various maps and valuable data at his command, explained the general plans of the Chicago Regional Planning association. Glencoe reported that court proceedings for paving and widening one section of the route are now pending and final plans and estimates are being completed for two other sections preparatory to spreading the assessment. Winnetka has two units completed, a third one, a little over a mile between Oak street and Winnetka avenue, in court for confirmation, with a fourth unit and a fifth unit still in a state of preparation of plans.

Kenilworth is ready to go into court for confirmation and is contingent upon one Winnnetka section being finally agreed upon. This section is the 1200 foot road in a small sub-division just south of Winnetka avenue. Wilmette has its project in preparation and new right-of-way has been acquired to straighten out the route while a little more right-of-way is needed and is being purchased by the village to make the highway continuous.

Will Not Draw Trucks

One important point brought out was the fact that traffic on this route many. It was pointed out that the village stores and making house art. deliveries. Truck traffic now is less traffic, it said. Through truck traffic from Chicago northward would not be attracted by this route, wherein drivers would encounter too many cross streets and in other ways be retarded by traffic through the various villages. 
Carl Leopold Elected Triangle Club Leader
