Louis T. Schramm, of 550 Provident road, Winnetka, passed away at the St. Francis hospital, Evanston, Sunday morning at 5 o'clock, following an illness of about a week's duration, resulting, indirectly, from an attack of typhoid fever which he suffered last September. He had regained his health sufficiently to resume his work about the first of the year, but it proved to be for only a brief period and he again was compelled to return to the hospital. An operation for gall stones was found necessary, from the effect of which, Mr. Schramm, in his already weakened condition was unable to survive.

Mr. Schramm was chief clerk in the Evanston office of the Illinois Bell Telephone company, with which he had been associated for the past fifteen years. As a result of his ability and exceedingly cheerful disposition in all his dealings with the public and his business associates, he formed and retained a large number of friends through the north shore communities who are grieved to learn of his death.

He was a son of Peter J. and Anna Schramm and would have been 31 years of age next August. He was single, making his home with his mother, the father having preceded the son in death six years ago. A sister, Miss Florence, also survives, residing with her mother. Two brothers, Robert, of 4041 Lexington street, and Walter, of 6041 Rhodes avenue, both of Chicago, are the other surviving members of the family.
