

Getting the Right Start



Here we have a scene at the Chicago Commons Infant Welfare station which receives its support largely from Winnetka. The Winnetka Center of the Infant Welfare society, of which Mrs. George Parker, is chairman, is now conducting its drive in support of the station with the goal set at \$7,900. The Winnetka Center of the society is responsible for three classes of work carried on at the station. It includes the work for very young babies and expectant mothers. During 1925 the 513 babies cared for at the Commons station were called upon in their homes 3,046 times. A visiting nurse in addition to the care provided at the station maintains a close watch over the mother and child. Free medical advice is provided by physicians who contribute their services to the Commons.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN TO ALL persons interested, that the Village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois, having ordered that a local improvement be made, consisting of a Portland cement concrete walk to be constructed in the extension of Center Street, when acquired, and in Church Road, when widened, as the result of proceedings now pending in the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, bearing General Number 423317, along a line parallel with and two (2) feet northeasterly as measured at right angles to the southwesterly line and said line extended of said extension of Center Street, and said Church Road, as widened, as the result of said proceedings, all in the Village of Winnetka, County of Cook and State of Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the Village Clerk of said Village, and the said village having applied to the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, for an assessment for the cost of said improvement, according to the benefits, and a report and assessment roll having been made and returned to the said Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, and designated General Number 431229, the final hearing thereon will be held on the eighth day of March, A. D. 1926, or as soon thereafter as the business of the said Court will permit. All persons desiring may file objections in said Court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense. The ordinance for said improvement provides for the collection of said assessment in five (5) annual installments, with interest thereon at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum.

been willing to give regular volunteer service. Their own lives are made richer by the very fact that they are giving themselves in the interest of others, and thus the life of the village is made finer.

"One of the most useful pieces of work carried on during the summer is made possible because of Community House, in the camps which I have been able to conduct and which are returning large character values. It is planned to have two camps as usual this year, of about three weeks' duration each; the boys going on June 21 and the girls on July 12.

"Many have said, 'We could not imagine Winnetka without Community House, nor do we want to.' A glimpse at the boys' clubs which are conducted by Messrs. Edward K. Welles and Earl L. Weinstock would impress the fact that constructive use of the leisure time of youth lessens the irregularities of life which are likely to affect a whole community."
