

**Lecture Series Tells
of Making of the Bible**

"The Making of the New Testament" was the theme with which the Rev. Thomas A. Goodwin of the Winnetka Congregational church, on Wednesday evening of this week, began a short series of lectures on the origins of the Bible. He spoke of the fact that Christianity did not come from the New Testament, but the New Testament was the product of a religious experience which found its major expression in Christ-like lives. He told briefly the circumstances out of which several of the New Testament books arose, and something of the problems which they were written to solve.

Next Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in the library of the Congregational church, Mr. Goodwin will speak about "The Growth of the Old Testament." On April 28, he will tell briefly the story of the preservation and translations of the Bible, with some sidelights thrown on the subject by archeology. All are welcome to attend these meetings, and questions pertinent to the subject are invited.
