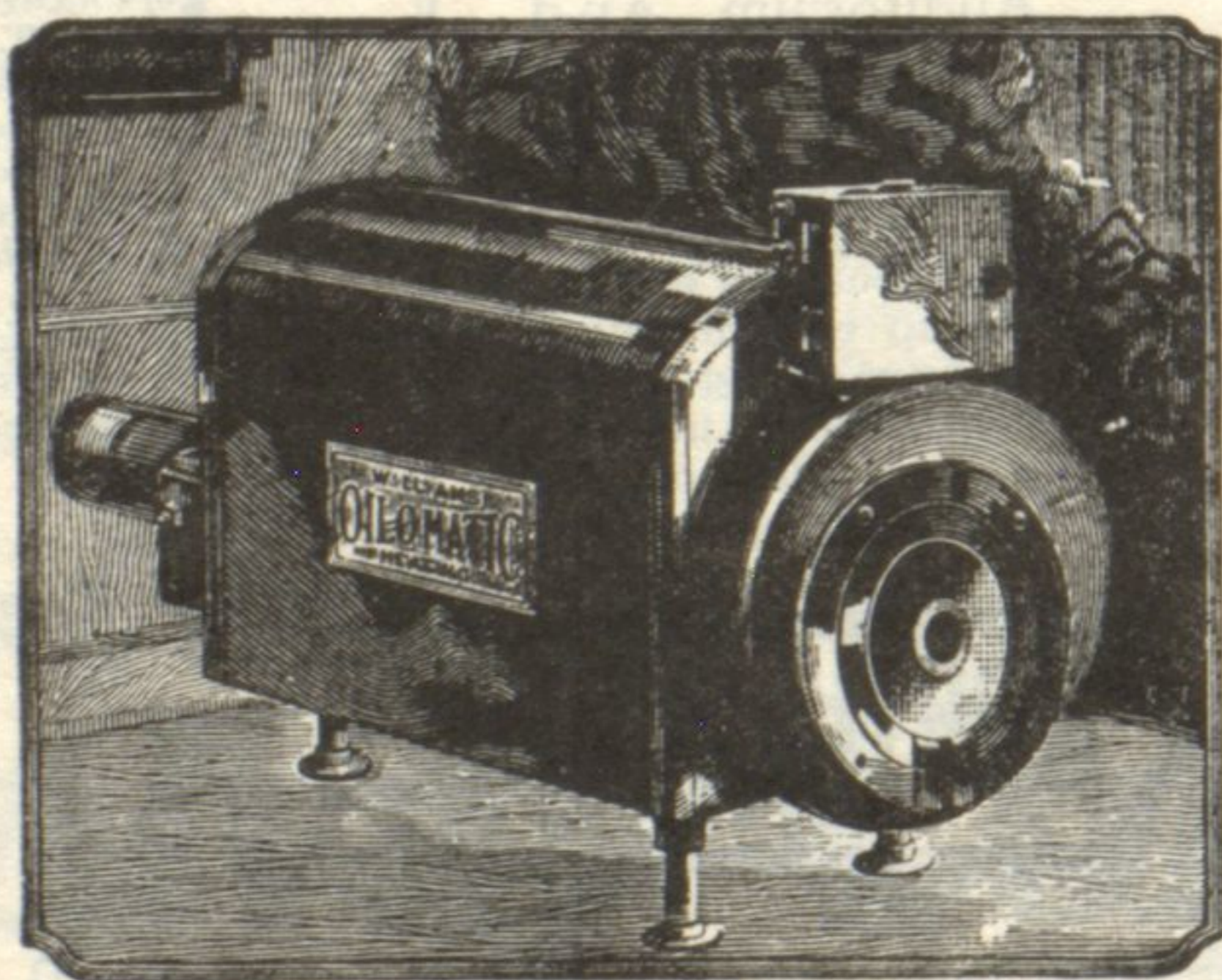
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### Message on Peace



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Richard Washburn Child, one of the headline speakers at the Fortieth District Rotary Conference to be held in Evanston next Monday and Tuesday, and to be attended by many north shore Rotarians, is one of the most widely read authors in America, and rated among her most distinguished diplomats. His address on "The Ways to World Peace" is regarded as of international importance.

In 1921, and again in 1924, Mr. Child was sent to Italy as Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary.

Ambassador Child was founder of the Council on Foreign Relations and Chief Representative of the United States at the Conference of Genoa in 1922 and the Conference of Lausanne in 1922.

He is author of several books including "Jim Hands," "The Man in the Shadow," "Potential Russia," "The Hands of Nara," and "Fresh Waters."
