**Corporations to  
Send Employes to  
Citizens' Camps**

Major General Graves announced this week from headquarters, Sixth Corps Area, at 1819 West Pershing road, Chicago, that the Citizens' Military Training Camps in the Sixth Corps Area are being well supported by firms and corporations that make special concessions to their employes to attend the camps by granting extra leave or pay to selected employes so that they can attend the 30-day training period. In Chicago the Balaban and Katz Theatre Corporation, Chicago Rapid Transit company, Swift and company, and Marshall Field and company (wholesale) have already made definite reservations for a number of specially selected employes. In Michigan the Motor Products Corporation of De-

troit, J. R. Jones and company, Kalamazoo, the Detroit Edison company, the Hudson Motor Car company, the City of Detroit and the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea company have made definite reservations for their employes. The benefits that young men derive from 30 days in the C. M. T. C. has been recognized by these employers and they fully appreciate that this training is not only beneficial to those attending, but that these young men return to their work in better physical condition and better employes by reason of this training. In 1925 over 450 different firms and corporations sent young men to the Citizens' Military Training Camps.

The government pays transportation of the young men who attend to and from their homes, provides food and clothing while at the camps and such medical attention as may be necessary. In addition to the physical and military training during the camps ample provision is made for recreation and athletics during the afternoon. Dances, shows, motion pictures and other forms of entertainment are provided for the evenings.

The requirements for attendance are that the applicant be of good moral character, physically qualified to undergo the training and be between 17 and 24 years of age.
