### Prizes and Scholarships Are Offered at New Trier

Several prizes and scholarships are available to pupils of New Trier high nated each year by Henry P. Williams, of Glencoe. Its purpose is to encourage literary effort in poetry, story, drama and essay. Another is the Barnett prize, donated by Otto R. Barnett, also of Glencoe, and awarded twice a year. One prize is for essays on civics and economics and the other for essays on birds. The Manierre Barlow Ware scholarship, providing financial aid to a New Trier student either at the school or in college, was established by Charles Ware of Kenilworth, in memory of his son Manierre Barlow Ware, a former pupil at New Trier high school who was killed in the war. There is also a scholarship providing similar aid for the school and one for boys by the Higirls maintained by the Girls' club of Y, a boys' organization.

Norman S. Patten was the architect and the contract for the high school structure was let in April of 1900 to C. E. Carson of Chicago.
