Reviews Municipal Progress By the Village Manager

The report covers the work of the Village departments for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1926. The purpose of the report was to review briefly the work of the past year and to outline a program of activity for the year ahead. It should be of interest to every citizen of the village, since it is, in effect, a statement of the condition of the corporation of which they are all stockholders. POLICE DEPARTMENT

The report of W. M. Peterson, chief of police, is transmitted herewith and covers adequately the activities of the police department during the past year, and the present needs of the department and recommendations concerning them have been covered by special communication of the chief of police, which has been transmitted to the village president.
