

TAKE GEOLOGY TRIP

Students and Instructors at Northwestern University to Leave for North Woods Soon

Professor U. S. Grant of Northwestern university already has fourteen persons registered for his novel canoe and field geological trip to start next month and to traverse the hidden lakes and infrequently visited streams of the Lake Superior country. On this journey, which may be the last of the sort to be taken by Dr. Grant for at least two years, the students will inspect and study the pre-Cambrian rocks of northeastern Minnesota and of adjacent portions of Ontario. While Miller's store at Ely, Minnesota, will be the actual outfitting point, members of the party, who do not depart from Evanston on August 12, may meet the group at South Range, Wisconsin, the following morning. This town is twenty miles south of Duluth.

Leaving Ely by canoe, with camping outfit and grub included, the following lakes will be visited and the Vermillion iron bearing country thoroughly studied: Lakes Long, Burntside, Brasswood, Birch, Carp, Knife, Kekequabic, Ogashke, Muncie, Gabi-Gichigama, Frog Rock, West Gull, Saganaga, Ottertrack, Bir Rock, Emerald and That Man's. Before starting on the canoe course in geology, each student is expected to be familiar with the common rock forming minerals and the common rocks, and as a matter of fact, students who register for this novel trip, are in a large measure embryo geologists who are taking regular geology courses in the large universities.

While each student pays his own expenses and the trip is one in which fun intersperses the hours of study, the course carries with it six semester hours of college credit.

One of the interesting stops will be at Gabbemichigama lake where the northern edge of the famous Keweenaw gabbro is exposed and where the effect of this mass on several varieties of older rocks is excellently exhibited. A few days also will be spent in a study of Saganaga granite and the arkose lying above it, and the still younger Knife lake slates. Stewart Edward White in his book, "The Forest," is reported to have described this lonely and majestic country in a picturesque manner.
